

Bryan Consoles Running Mate for Dearth of Votes

Governor-Elect Expresses Distress in Reply to Senator's Congratulating Message.

Lincoln, Nov. 9.—(Special)—What ever the rank and file of the Hitchcock men may think about it, Senator Hitchcock's wife, C. W. Bryan, that he is very grateful for the whole-hearted support he and "W. J." gave him. In his reply to W. Bryan's expressed distress over the senator's defeat, the telegrams exchanged are as follows:

"Hon. Charles W. Bryan, Lincoln, Neb. 'Accept my congratulations and best wishes for your administration. My own defeat is a surprise, but not much of a disappointment. Let me assure you of my appreciation for the loyal and whole-hearted support which you and W. J. gave me. 'G. M. HITCHCOCK."

"Senator G. M. Hitchcock, Omaha, Neb. 'My Dear Senator: The lack of the necessary votes to elect you has been a great surprise to me and deeply distressing to me. You made a wonderful campaign for the entire ticket and party, and but for most unusual conditions, you would have been re-elected. Your leadership and advice of yourself and your splendid paper will be of great service to the democrats and common people of this state, and I want you to feel that I will need and will sincerely appreciate your fullest cooperation during the trying two-year period through which I will pass as chief executive of Nebraska. Your congratulations and best wishes over my election and for my administration are very gratifying, yet the loss of the senator, the legislator and most of the state ticket depresses me."

"CHARLES W. BRYAN." The following telegrams were exchanged between Mr. Hitchcock, the defeated candidate, and Mr. Bryan: "Hon. Charles W. Bryan, Lincoln, Neb. "Charles H. Randall, Randolph, Neb. 'Your telegram of congratulations upon my election as governor is most kind and generous of you, and I deeply appreciate the expression of good will therein. The conditions in the state will, as you say, require level-headed business judgment in the chief executive office, and I will appreciate any suggestion during my incumbency that may occur to you that will advance the interests of the people of Nebraska. 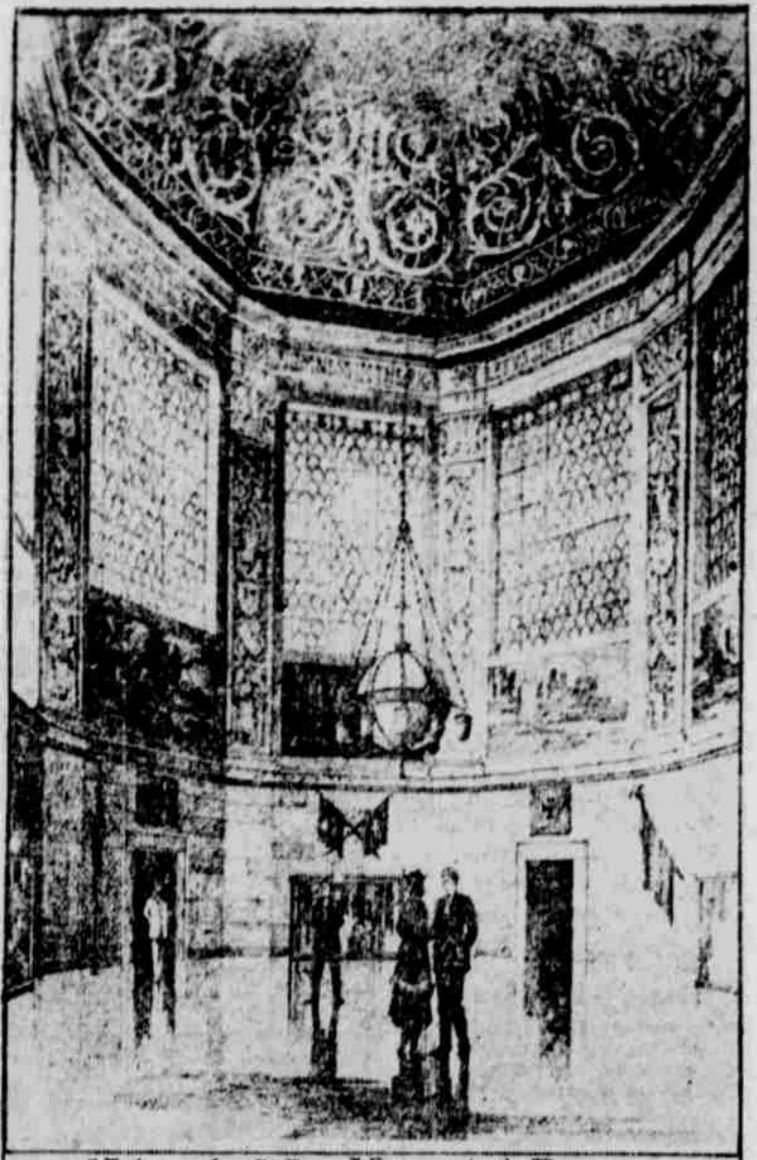

Bryan Declares Victory Is Rap at Extravagance

Governor-Elect Issues Statement Saying Waste Permitted by Code Law Was Rebuked by Voters.

Lincoln, Nov. 9.—(Special)—C. W. Bryan, governor-elect, says that the result of the election was not a personal compliment to him, but a rebuke to the waste and extravagance of the state administration. He is not thoroughly pleased over the fact that he is entirely surrounded by republicans, but he hopes that the public interest will permit harmony of action. His statement follows: "The result of the Nebraska election on governor is most gratifying. However, it indicates the intense feeling of the people over the doubling of the expense to the taxpayers in handling the administrative affairs of the state and of duplicating state officers and employes as has been done under the code system."

"Transferring the authority out of the hands of the people's own constitutional officers into the hands of the governor, who, in turn under the code law transfers authority into the hands of countless employes out of reach of the people, who are supposed to be supreme, has been rebuked in no uncertain tones, and I am not vain enough to feel that the result of the election on governor was intended as a personal compliment to myself."

"While the election of a governor of one political party and a majority of the legislature and a majority of the state officers of another political party might be compared to giving a man a new automobile of one make and then supplying him with vital parts of it from another factory that might not adjust themselves as quickly and operate as smoothly as a complete new car of one build with all parts functioning smoothly from the start, yet I feel that the desires and needs of the people throughout Nebraska at this time are such that they have selected for the executive, administrative and legislative branches of the government, representatives who can and will work in harmony to give the people not only the relief that they need from oppressive taxation, but who will restore the form of government that recognizes the American theory of government that authority which officials have, comes from below and is not dictated from the top as it is under kings."

"I take this opportunity of expressing my sincere appreciation of the splendid support received during the campaign and at the ballot box."

RADIO Rival Stations to Broadcast Duet

Louisville, Ky.—The broadcasting station at Louisville WHAS and at Atlanta WSB, are planning an experiment in duet broadcasting. One will broadcast the instrumental music of a given program while the other will broadcast the vocal part.

Credo Harris, manager of the station at Louisville, and Maj. John Cohen, director of the Atlanta Journal plant, are at work on the details of the experiment. One idea suggested is that each studio install a Western Union self-setting clock adjusted so that the pendulum has a half-second swing, tune the pianos to 400 pitch, and adjust transmitters as near as practically possible to a 350 meter wave length.

If the experiment works successfully it will open up a new field of possibilities in the realm of radio broadcasting by a number of stations in concert, each plant furnishing some specific part of the music or program.

"Ariograms" is the name given to United States Department of Agriculture radio reports.

The Los Angeles Evening Herald is broadcasting lessons in code 15 minutes every week day. This is the first step in the way of definite instruction by radio. The University of California extension division, Berkeley, is supplying a correspondence course in elementary radio. California is keeping to the fore in radio enterprise.
