Jan. 18 -- (Special.)-Exenditure of \$21,992,554.41 by the state vernment during the next two years is recommended by Governor Charles W. Bryan, in a budget message delivered this afternoon before a joint session of the senate and lower house of the state legislature.

Under the law the governor's figures cannot be increased except by three-fifths vote of each house. The Bryan budget is \$2,347,243.46 less than that recommended by the eral, is mentioned in well-informed retiring governor, S. R. McKelvie, whose total was \$24,339,797.87. 

Chevenne, Wyo., Jan. 18.-Pilot F. Acor were killed when an air wall plane they were testing crashed at the local field at 2:15 this afternoon, The airplane fell 500 feet and in stantly burst into flames. Both bodies were burned.
