



Many persons who had been holding places in the line at the land office in Durango, Col., changed their minds and joined the rush for locations in the Ute lands, which were opened for settlement at noon on the 4th by proclamation of the president. Whistles and bells proclaimed the hour of opening. Scores of men who had been holding places in line sold out half an hour before the opening, \$50 being the prevailing price. It is estimated that 1,000 people sought in various ways to secure land.

The board of missions for the Methodist Episcopal church, south, in session in Memphis, made an appropriation for the year as follows: China mission, \$27,162; Corea mission, \$7,650; Japan mission, \$31,714; Central Mexico mission, \$27,127; Mexican border mission, conference, \$3,850; Northwestern Mexican mission, conference, \$12,650; Indian mission, conference, \$10,948; Brazil mission, \$3,400; Cuban mission, \$5,000. A permit was granted to the bishops to raise a sum not exceeding \$7,000 to supplement work in Cuba-




