### PROCLAMATION.

ESTABLISHING QUARANTINE. EXECUTIVE OFFICE, LINCOLN, NEBRASKA, July 18, 1885.

LINCOLN, NEBRASKA, July 18, 1885.

WHEREAS: The Live Stock Sanitary Commission of the State of Nebraska at a meeting of said commission held at Lincoln, Nebraska, on the 16th day of July, A. D. 1885, adopted the following preamble and resolution:

"WHEREAS, It has come to the knowledge of the Live Stock Sanitary Commission of the State of Nebraska that contagious pleuropneumonia and other contagious diseases exist among the cattle of the following named states, viz: All of the state of Connecticut, New York, New Jersey, Delaware, Maryland, Virginia, West Virginia, Ohio, Illinois, Kentacky, Tennessee, Missouri and the District of Columbia, therefore be it

RESOLVED, That His Excellency, Governor James W. Dawes be and hereby is respectfully requested to issue a proclamation prohibiting the importation into this state of all cattle coming from the above named places, except un-

ing from the above named places, except under such rules and regulations as shall be prescribed by the Live Stock Sanitary Commission of this state."

Now, therefore, I, James W. Dawes, Governor of the State of Nebraska, complying with the above request, and in accordance with the authority in me vested by the statutes of Nebraska, do hereby issue my proclamation declaring and establishing quarantine against the introduction of all cattle from all or any of the states above named, unless such cattle of the states above named, unless such cattle are quarantined at the point of entry to this state for at least ten days: and retained there until they shall receive a certificate of health signed by the State Veterinarian of Nebraska, or an authorized inspector of the state. And further that all the cattle coming into Nebraska from said above named states are required to enter the state at Omaha, Plattsmouth, Blair or Falls City. The quarantined so declared, and established, will be enforced by the Live Stock Sanitary Commission and the State Veterinarian.

State of Nebraska, ex ral., Frank W. Mattoon and Wm. C. Hill vs. the Republican Valley railroad company: The respondent is ordered to forthwith change the order, method and manner of runing its trains on its lines between Wymore and Beatrice, so that all passenger trains running thereon shall stop at such point as may be established for a depot at Blue Springs as hereinafter provided, sufficiently long for the receipt and discharge of passengers and that a sufficient number of freight trains on said line shall stop at such depot as shall meet the demands of the business of the said Blue Springs; which said order, method or manner of running said trains shall be adopted and maintained by said respondent so as not to discriminate against said Blue Springs or its business or the depot to be erected and established there as hereinafter provided. Also that the said respondent is ordered within sixty days from said date, to lay down, erected and establish at some point on its said line within the corporate limits of the city of Blue Springs suitable side tracks, switches and depot buildings adequate to the business of said Blue Springs, and that it hereafter keep and maintain the same so as not to discriminate against the said Blue Springs, its business or depot, provided, that said sids tracks and switches may be laid down, said depot erected and such trains stopped as herein-before, provided, at some suitable point contiguous to said city of Blue Springs, and without its corporate limits in case such point and location hall be agreed upon by the mayor and couneil of said city of Blue Springs, within thirty days from this date, such agreement to be evidenced by ordinance or in such other manner as may be equally as binding upon said city,
