SOME of McShane's bar'l seems to have found its way into the Lincoln Daily Call office, judging from the manner in which that "anti" paper is lampooning the "old governor."

OWING to the great coal strike now in progress in England the price of coal has advanced two shillings per ton. With the prospects of dear bread and dear coal, the outlook is decidedly serious for the English workingman. A demonstration of the unemployed and discontented in Trafalgar Square, such as took place this spring, may be looked for at any moment as the first mutterings of the storm.

AS THE campaign draws to a close the republican speeches increase in force and excellence, while those of the democrats become more trivial and absurd. The explanation lies in the fact that the former have truth and patriotism on their side, whereas the latter are entirely wanting in such advantages. It is easy for an orator to be eloquent and effective when the doctrines which he advocates are sound and attractive.

THE grand commandery Knights Templar of Iowa has openly rebelled against the new ritual adopted by the late triennial convocation, and will stand by the old one. Their course is considered by the commanderies of the neighboring states as revolutionary, and the Iowa knights have been denied fellowship. What the outcome will be cannot be foreseen, but the disruption will be watched with great interest by members of the order throughout the country.

WITH the disappearance of the once celebrated surplus, the Mills bill loses all its argument of practical necessity. It becomes a purely theoretical measure, not designed to remedy an intolerable condition, but to start the tariff ball rolling down the American slopes until it shall plunge into a sea over which foreign countries can send their goods without meeting the slightest obstacle on this side. The shaft prepared ostensibly to prick an imaginary surplus remains as a thorn in the Democratic side.—New York Sun.

IT is curious to think how indifferent are some people to those atmospheric changes which so signally effect the health and temper of others. You will see one man on a rainy day or a cold day so transformed from good nature to acidity and bitterness that his best friends would fain get out of his way—at least till the "wind changes." Those of less sensitive organization have little patience and less pity for what they cannot understand; yet this unfortunate class are not for that reason to be shut out in the cold until they "come to." A little sympathy—some cheerful topic of conversation adroitly introduced—some pleasing little personal attention at the right moment—and lo! the mental clouds disperse and all again is sunshine.

THE supreme court, Monday, sustained the constitutionality of the prohibitory law of Iowa. The point of issue was the right to manufacture intoxicating liquors solely for exportation to other states, despite the state law, and it was pleaded that the prohibitory feature, in so far as manufacture for exportation is concerned, was in conflict with constitutional provisions giving congress the sole right to regulate interstate commerce. The case is that of J. S. Kidd, distiller, plaintiff in error, versus I. E. Pierson and S. J. Loughras. The court holds that the state law prohibiting both manufacture and sale, except for medicinal, medicinal, pulmonary and sacramental purposes is not in conflict with interstate commerce provisions and decisions of the Iowa court are sustained. Opinion by Justice Lamar.

SOME of our contemporaries are making honest attempts to describe clearly the political situation in New York. The country is too full of busy men to render any such attempt successful. All that appears to be surely known about the situation in New York is that the republicans are satisfied with their ticket, state and national, and are working together honestly for the first time in many years, while the democracy of the various "halls" and factions are pulling hair in a very desperate fashion and one of the factions is circulating papers for signature, pledging the signers to vote for Cleveland for president, and Miller, republican, for governor. Still the hair pulling may cease suddenly before the election and both parties may poll a full vote. The circumstances are on the whole quite favorable to the success of the republican state and national tickets in New York.

HERE is a brief summary of President Cleveland's record on pension bills compared with the record of three republican presidents who preceded him. It hardly bears out the assertion that he is "the old soldier's friend." Private pension legislation, number bills passed during the Forty-ninth congress, 939; number of bills during the first session of the Fiftieth congress, 751; number of bills vetoed by President Cleveland to date, 206, or 1 veto to nearly 3 bills, being about 12 per cent. vetoed. Number of bills approved by Grant, Hayes and Arthur, 1,614; number of bills vetoed, eight, or one veto to 200 bills, being only one-half of 1 per cent., and not one of the eight were vetoed on their merits or questions of fact, but in the interest of the soldier. In addition to these vetoed bills by President Cleveland twenty-five other bills failed to receive his approval.

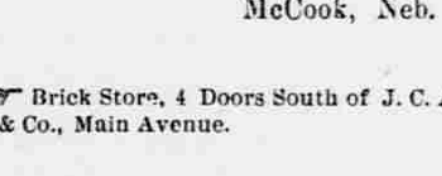
