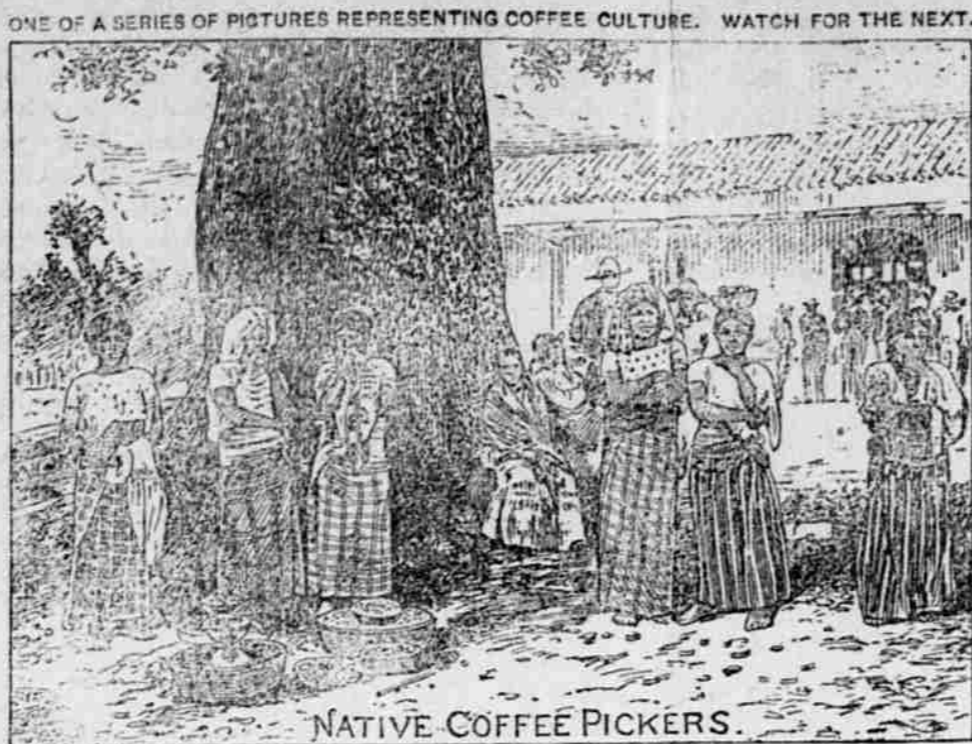

E. M. Farnsworth, War Claim Attorney, arrived from Decatur, Iowa, on train No. 1, October 9th, to attend the reunion, and will remain here about ten days.

THE MCCOOK REUNION.

Great Gathering of Old Soldiers in Western Nebraska.

McCook, Neb., Oct. 8.—On the grassy slope overlooking the city from the west, a city of canvas has been erected in the last twenty-four hours. It is Camp General McCook, and on to-morrow what is destined to be the largest and most successful reunion ever had in western Nebraska begins. Our merchants have been busy as bees to-day in decorating their places of business and to-night the city is draped and festooned with the national colors. Three large arches on Main Avenue have a very pleasing effect. Col. Gateheli arrived to-day and has been busy getting the camp in order. General McCook, after whom our city was named, will arrive to-morrow. Governor Thayer, Secretary Laws, State Treasurer Hill, Colonel Stein, General S. J. Alexander, Colonel Ed. Roggen will arrive to-morrow. General Colby will arrive Thursday. Battery A from Wymore and the Nelson and Juniata National Guards will arrive Thursday. General S. H. Morrison, department commander of the G. A. R., will be present Thursday and Friday. A large attendance is expected to whom the people of McCook will extend their warmest hospitality.

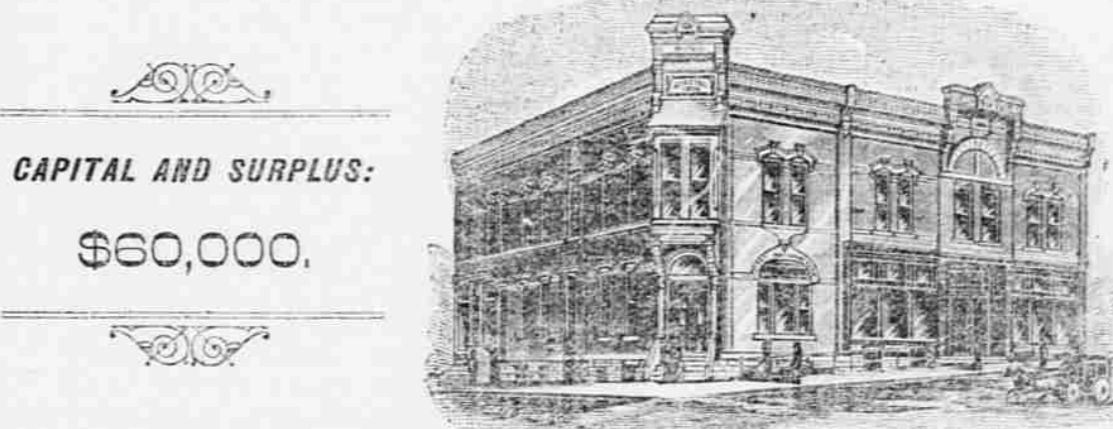
