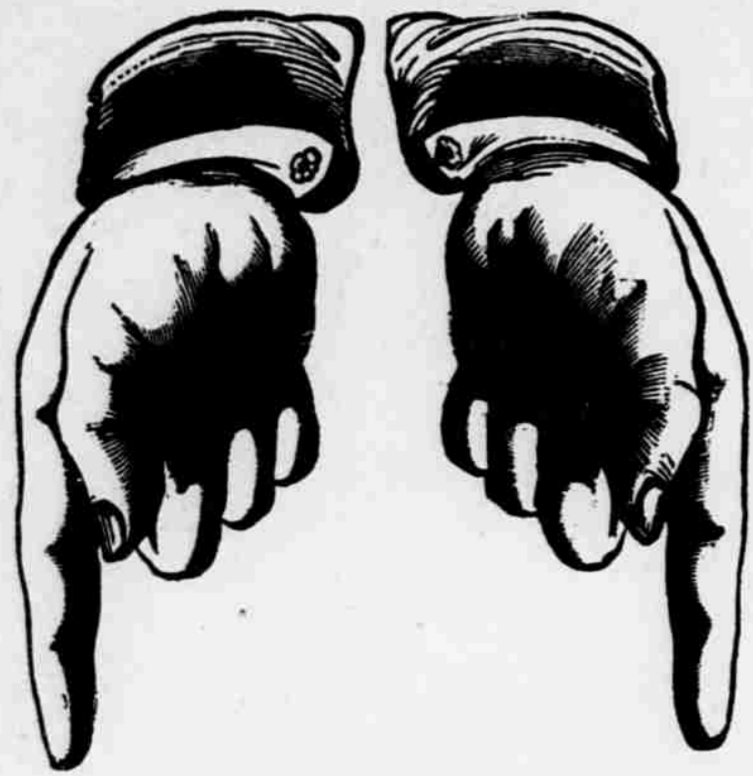

The board finds the total valuation of all real and personal property, as corrected by the Board of Equalization to be one million, three hundred and fifty-seven thousand, two hundred and sixty-six (\$1,357,266.61) dollars. 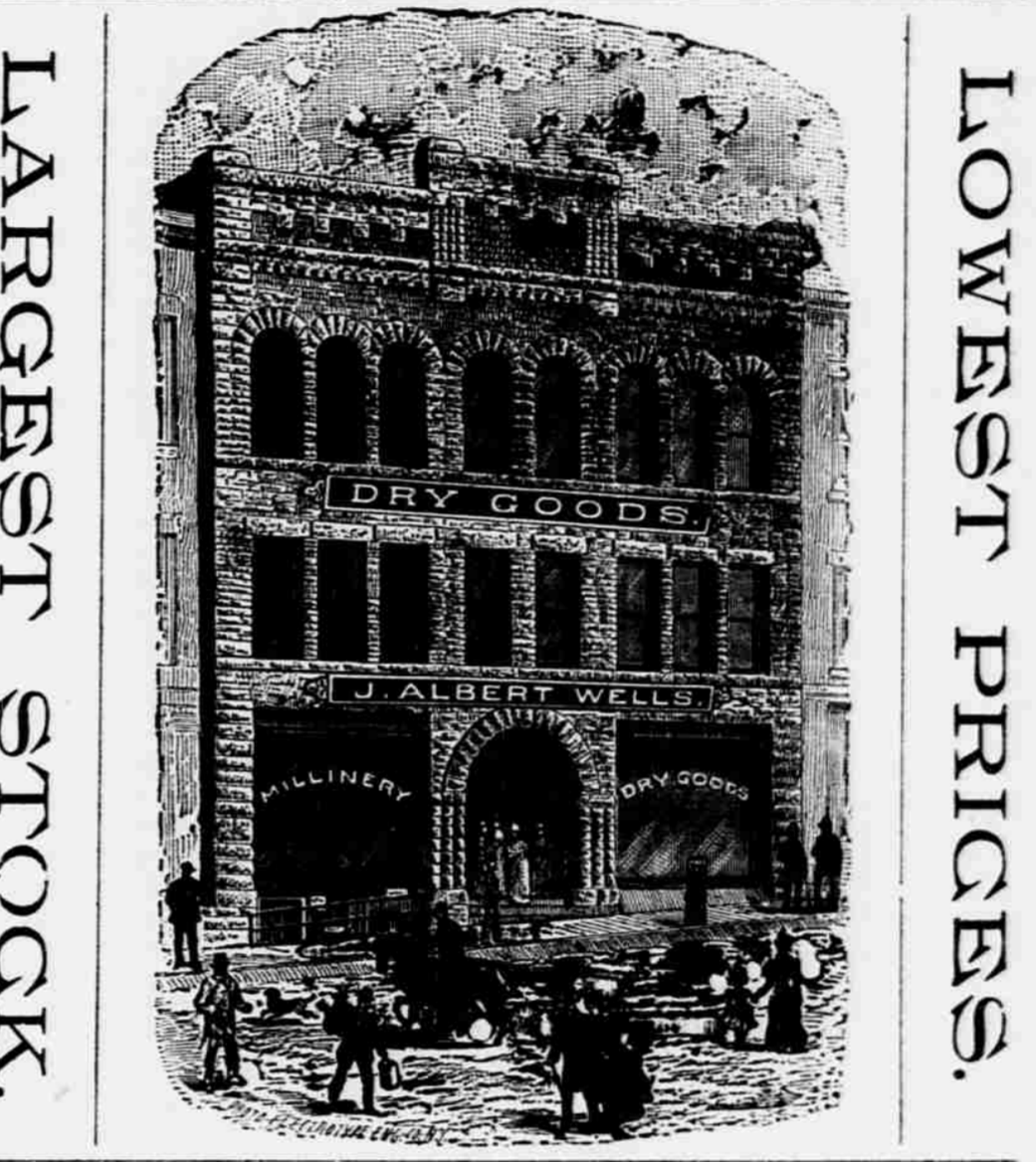
