THE opposition of other labor organizations to the Knights of Labor in New York will hasten the dissolution of that once mighty union of workmen. The condition of the order in the Empire state is a reflex of its condition elsewhere. Disintegration set in the moment politicians were admitted to its rank. Thousands of political tricksters, whose friendship for labor was measured by the votes in sight, were permitted to dictate its plans and policies, and sacrifice its well-being for their personal advancement. Whether the order will survive mismanagement and dictatorial recklessness remains to be seen. It is passing through the fires, and may emerge free from the political barnacles and wreckers. In any event the cause of organized labor will be benefitted. Other and broader organizations are already rising from the ruins, strengthened by the experience of the Knights, and managed by men who will not attempt to rule the world. Such a result will bring about a close alliance among all labor organizations and harmonize the radical difference now existing between kindred orders.—Bee.
