As far as we are aware no care is being taken to prevent the spread of diphtheria. Health officers look after such matters in town, but in the country people may take foolish risks if they please. Use plenty of carbolic acid, burn sulphur in your houses and look out for filth of any sort. Prevention is better than cure.

Last Saturday Mr. Quigley's little girl was buried at the Christian church. She had been ill for several days with a bad sore throat but no medical aid was thought necessary. On Thursday or Friday night the little girl retired as usual but the next morning failed to rise with the other children. When a member of the family went to awaken her she was found to be sleeping that sleep which knows no awakening on earth. The bereaved parents have the sympathy of the entire neighborhood. Dr. Hoyt of Indianola was called and decided that the child had died of diphtheria. Sunday morning three more of Mr. Quigley's children were said to be seriously ill with the same disease. Later we learned that they were improving.

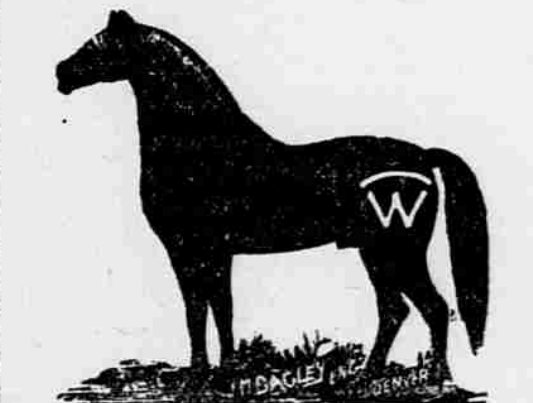

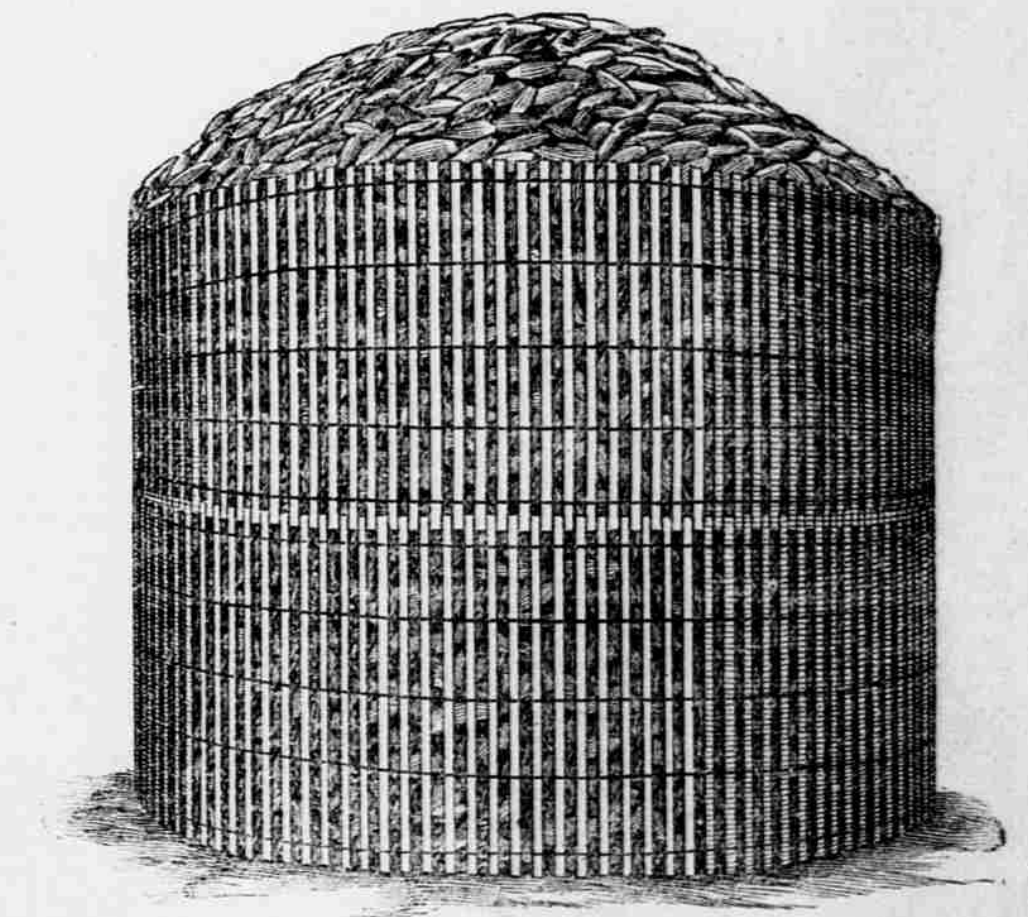
