Slight Changes In the Political Complexion of the Next Senate.

LATE RETURNS FROM STATES

Chairman Faulkner Concedes a Republican Working Majority In the Next House--Secretary Edgerton Claims the Election of 22 Populists.

Washington, Nov. 5.-Later returns indicate slight changes in the next senate from the table sent yesterday. The five doubtful states yesterday were Delaware, Kansas, Kentucky, North Carolina and South Dakota. It is now sasonably certain Delaware will have a Republican legislature. The only claim to the contrary being of irregularities in Sussex county. Kansas will elect a fusion or independent senator to succeed Peffer, and Kentucky on the face of the returns will elect a Republican to succeed Blackburn. North Carolina legislature is in doubt, with chances favoring the success of the fusionists, who, in this state, were made up of Republicans and Populists. Until the legislature actually chooses Senator Pritchard's successor, it cannot be told whether North Carolina's new senator will act with the Republican majority, and he is not classified in either the Republican or Independent column, but in the doubtful list. South Dakota is still in doubt, with the chances favoring a fusion Independent. The senate therefore, on this estimate, would stand: Republic ... , 44; Democrats, 32; Independent, and Populists, 12; doubtful, 2. Total, 90.

Washington, Nov. 5.—Chairman Faulkner of the Democratic congressional committee conceded today that the Republicans would have a working majority in the house, but said they would not be able to control the senate. He asserted that the silver men will control the senate. Secretary Edgerton of the Populist committee makes the following claim as to the election of Populists in the next house: Kansas, 6; Nebraska, 4; South Dakota, 2; North Carolina, 5; Idaho, 1; Colorado, 1; California, 1; Alabama, 1; Minnesota, 1; total, 22; with possibly one more each from California, Alabama, Illinois and Indiana. In addition, he says one silver Republican each from Colorado, Montana, Washington, Nevada, Minnesota and In-

Result In Wyoming Is Very Close. Cheyenne, Nov. 5 .- Returns to the Democratic committee show a plurality for Bryan electors of 503, and for Osborne for congress, 604 votes.
