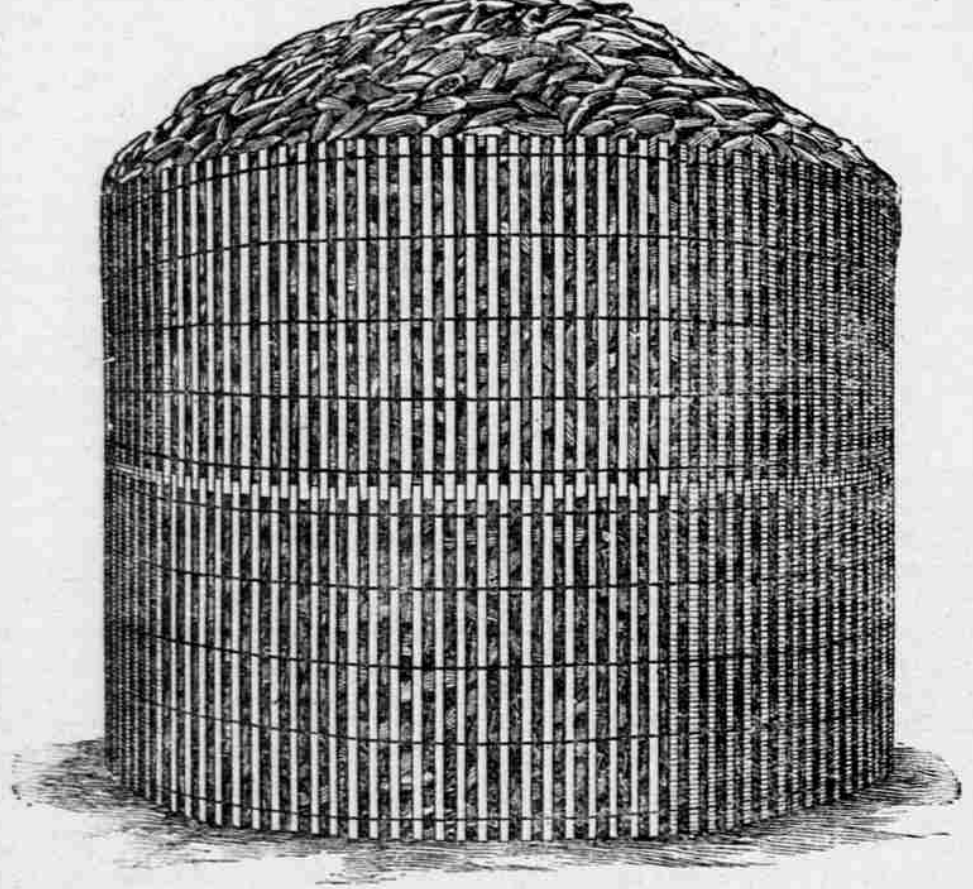

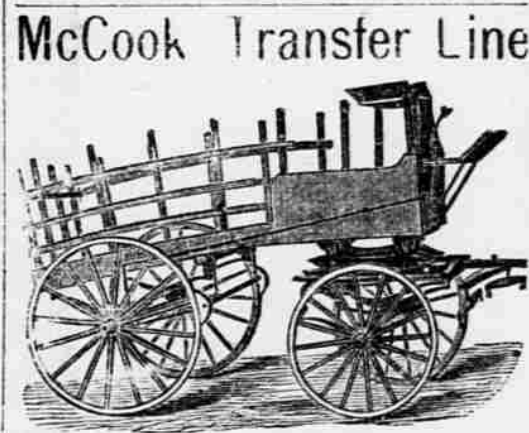

Mrs. William McCallum and Miss Welburn of the superintendent's office were McCook visitors, Thursday.

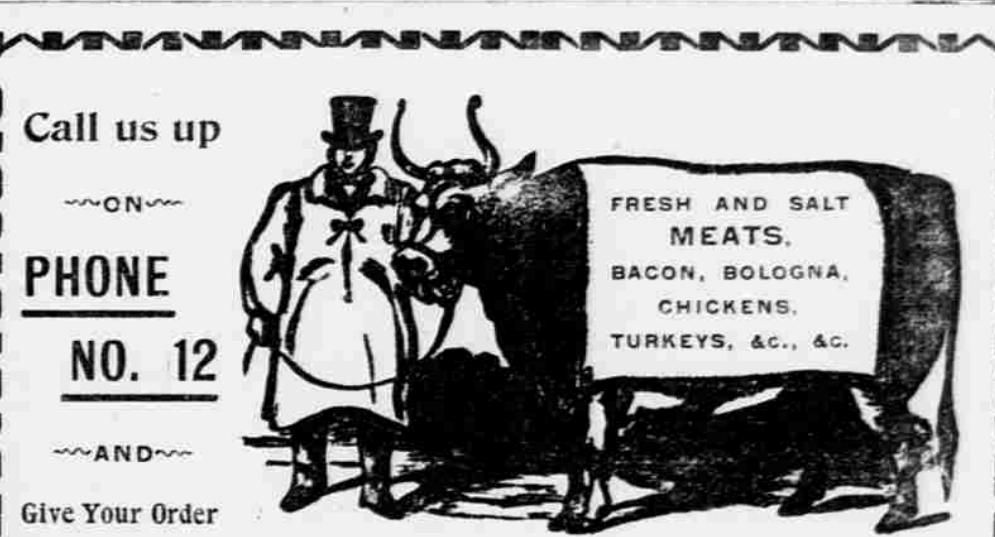
Ora Smith was the guest of Deputy Sheriff Smith's family, Saturday and Sunday. She returned home, Monday morning on 2.
