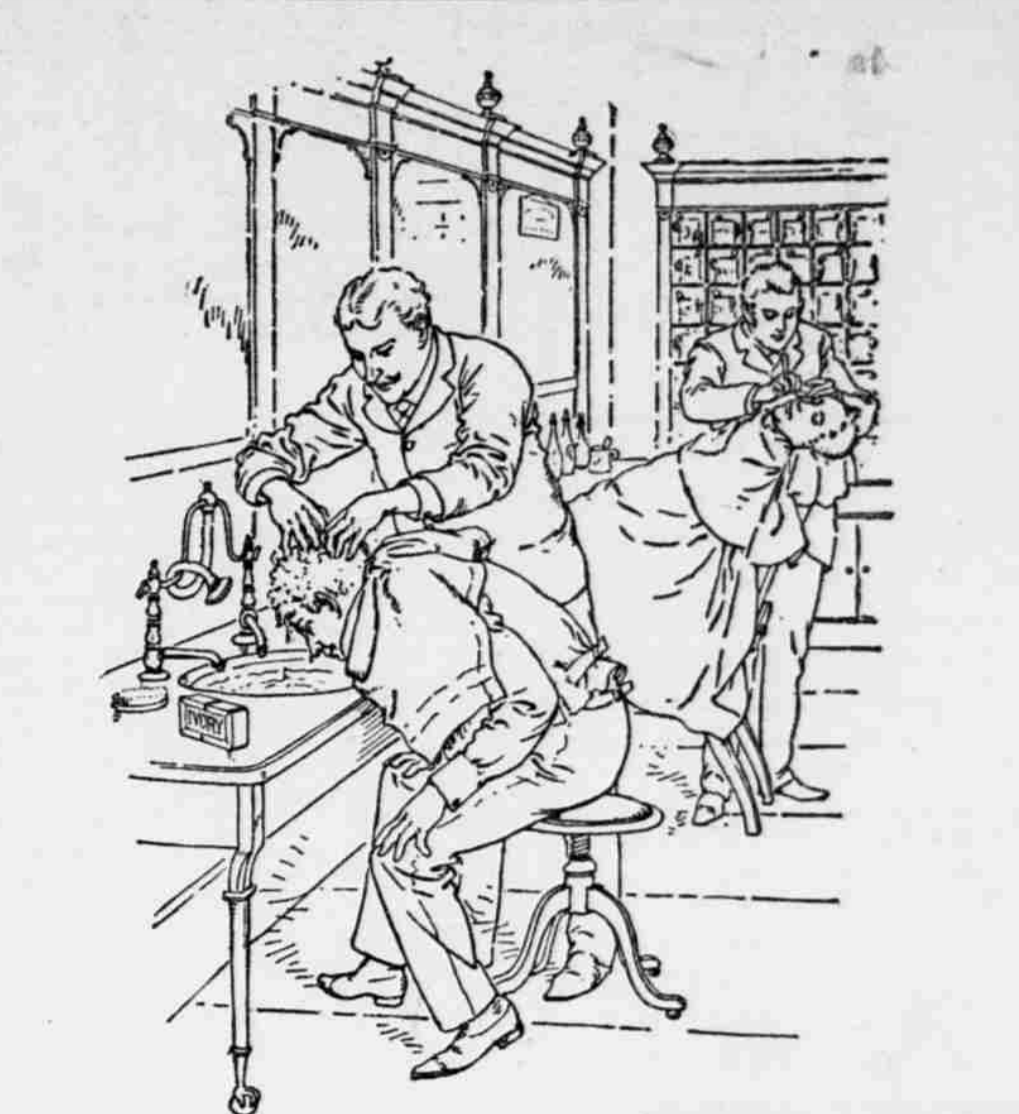
One important step necessary in driving out the saloon is for temperance workers to unite, as far as practicable, instead of being divided into factions, at war with each other.

A Just Complaint.
A number of the merchants of the city complain that the sign boards erected by them at various places throughout the county have been defaced and destroyed and they desire to call attention to the following law relating to the destruction of property:
"If any person shall wilfully and maliciously injure or destroy to any amount less than one hundred dollars, any personal property of any description whatsoever, or any building or other structure of any kind, owned by any other person, every person so offending shall be imprisoned in the jail of the proper county not exceeding thirty days and shall moreover be fined in double the amount of the damage of the property injured or destroyed."
They have expended sums in procuring and placing these signs and if the destruction continues, they intend to combine for the purpose of taking steps to discover and prosecute the guilty persons.
