McCook, Nebraska, November 14, 1900.
Board of county commissioners met pur-
suant to adjournment. Present, Henry Cra-
tree, Stephen Bolles and D. A. Waterman,
county commissioners; W. R. Starr, county
attorney, and R. A. Green, county clerk.
Minutes of previous meeting read and ap-
proved.

The following official bonds were examined
and on motion approved:

Chas. K. Dutcher, assessor, Bondville pre-
dict.

Joseph Junker, road overseer, road district
No. 22.

On motion the county treasurer was di-
rected to transfer \$800 from the county gen-
eral fund to the county road fund.

In the matter of the personal tax of C. B.
Wahlquist, for the year 1899. It appearing to
the board from the report of the county treas-
urer of Adams county that the proposition
made by C. B. Wahlquist as to the payment
of said tax at its face, remitting all penalties,
is just to all parties. On motion the county
treasurer was instructed to accept said propo-
sition.

The following was on motion adopted:
State of Nebraska, Red Willow county. To
the county treasurer of said county:

Whereas it appears to this board that the
following described tract in McCook, Red
Willow county, Nebraska, to-wit: Commencing
fifty-two feet east of sw corner of lot 6,
block thirty (30), thence north fifty feet,
thence east twenty-six feet, thence south fifty
feet, thence west to beginning, was offered for
sale for delinquent taxes for the years 1895,
1896, 1897, 1898, and 1899 and not sold for
want of bidders. It further appearing that
said tract is of less value than the amount of
