ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION OF BARNETT LUMBER COMPANY.
Know all men by these presents that we, the undersigned, have associated ourselves together for the purpose of forming and becoming a corporation in the state of Nebraska, for the transaction of the business hereinafter stated and for the purpose of continuing the business of the corporation under the same name whose incorporation expires March 1st, 1902.

Art. 1. The name of the Corporation shall be Barnett Lumber Company. The principal place for the transaction of its business shall be in the City of McCook, Red Willow County, State of Nebraska, and branch yards may be established elsewhere.

Art. 2. The nature of the business to be transacted is dealing in Lumber, Coal, Grain, Hardware, Live Stock, Real Estate, General Merchandise, Contracting and such other business as we may desire to conduct.

Art. 3. The authorized capital of said Corporation shall be One Hundred Thousand (\$100,000) Dollars in Shares of One Hundred (\$100) Dollars each, full paid and non-assessable, with the privilege of increasing said capital upon a two-thirds vote of all the stockholders, giving one vote for each share of stock.

Art. 4. The existence of this Corporation shall begin on the 1st day of March, 1902, and continue during the period of twenty years.

Art. 5. The business of said Corporation shall be conducted by a Board of Directors, not to exceed five in number, to be elected by the stockholders.

Art. 6. The manner of voting at meetings of the stockholders for choice of members of the Board of Directors shall be by ballot and each stockholder shall be entitled to cast one vote, in person or by proxy, for each share of stock owned or held by him. There shall be an annual meeting of the stockholders of this Corporation at the office of the Company in the City of McCook, Nebraska, for the election of directors and for the transaction of such other business as may be necessary on the first Monday of January of each year.

Art. 7. The officers of this Corporation shall consist of President, Vice President, Secretary and Treasurer who shall be chosen by the directors and shall hold their offices for the period of one year and until their successors are elected subject however to the will of the Board of Directors.

Art. 8. Private property of the stockholders shall be exempt from liability for the debts of the Corporation.

Art. 9. The highest amount of indebtedness to which this Corporation shall at any time subject itself shall not be more than Sixty-Six Thousand (\$66,000) Dollars.

Art. 10. The Company is hereby empowered to hold real estate and personal property of all kinds.

Art. 11. The Company may have a corporate seal upon which shall be inscribed the words, "Barnett Lumber Company."

Whereas, there is \$1,200.46 in the sinking fund and

Whereas, the county bond for which this fund was created has been paid.

Therefore be it resolved, that the treasurer be instructed to transfer said sum (\$1,200.46) into the general fund, and all money derived from that levy. Secundo by Bennett. The roll-call resulted as follows: Ayes—Waterman, Reddy and Bennett. Carried.

R. M. Osborn was appointed deputy sheriff. The official bond of R. M. Osborn was examined and on motion approved.	

Petition of Win Nelson Downs and others asking for a public road was read and considered. The Board finds that all owners of land along line of proposed road have given consent thereto in writing. On motion same was granted establishing a public road as follows: Commencing at the Northeast corner of the Northwest quarter of section twenty, township two, North, range eight, West 1/2 P. M., thence West one and one-half miles to Northwest corner of section nineteen, said township and range, and terminating thereat, and clerk was instructed to notify overseers of highway to open said road.

Petition of W. T. Henton and others, asking for the location of a public road, read and considered. The Board find that all the requirements of the law have been complied with. On motion petition was granted and road established as follows: Commencing at a point on section line at the south end of bridge, about 9 rods north of the quarter section line running east and west, said section line between the Northwest 1/4 of section 18, and the Northwest 1/4, section 17, town 18, range twenty-seven, thence in a southeasterly course, about 65 rods to a point about 15 rods east of said section line, thence in a southeasterly course about 15 rods to a point 1/2 mile East of the Southwest corner of the Northwest quarter of section 17-1-27, thence South about 32 rods, thence in a Southeasterly course about 12 rods, intersecting the section line, road between sections 17 and 18, town one, range twenty-seven, and clerk was instructed to notify overseers of highway to open said road.

Pursuant to law in such cases made and provided the sum of \$45 was for motion appropriated from the general fund of the county to defray the expense of holding a teachers' institute.

On motion Board adjourned to meet Tuesday, May 6, 1902.
