



ORDINANCE NO. 115.

An ordinance promoting public health and safe-

rags and other rubbish of a combustible nature, the accumulation of any such business, must be burned. Provided, that two or more doing bus-iness in the same block may join in the con-struction, maintainance and use of one such burner. The construction, location and erection

thereof shall be under the immediate supervision of the City Marshal.

Section 2. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to keep, expose for sale, sell or give away within the City of McCook any tor pixel with a property of the cook any tor pixel with a section. toy pistol using explosives, air-guns, caps, can-non crackers, explosive canes, rockets and any and all fire works containing dynamite, gun-cotton, giant powder or any other kind of explo-sive of a higher grade than common gun powder. Section 3. Any person or persons who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereo; be fined in any sum not less than five dollars nor more than fifty dollars

for each offense and stand committed until such fine and costs are paid.

Section 4. Ordinance No. 39, passed and ap-proved February 11th, 1893, relating to the dis-position of rubbish and offal be, and is hereby Section 5. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after passage and publica-

An ordinance to amend sections 1 and 3 of Ordinance No. 113, entitled sidewalks and to repeal said original sections.

Be it ordained by the Mayor and Council of the City of McCook, Nebraska, that sections 1 and 3 of Ordinance No. 113 be amended to read as follows:

Section I. Sec. 1 as amended: That the construction of all sidewalks hereinafter laid, widened or rebuilt shall be done under the supervision and directions of the committee on "streets and alleys" and under such rules and League. 113, entitled sidewalks, passed and approved May 10, 1904, be, and the same is hereby repealed. Section 4. This ordinance to take effect and be in force from and after passage and publica-


