**Some Recent Burlington Promotions.**

The promotion of G. W. Rhodes to be general superintendent of the northwest district of the Burlington lines west of the river comes after thirty-three years of railroad service, about eighteen of which have been spent in the Burlington, and nearly five of the eighteen in Lincoln. The northwestern district, including three divisions, was turned over to him, with H. J. German in charge as assistant to the general superintendent, Saturday morning last.

G. W. Rhodes began railroading with the Pennsylvania, and was with that company for fourteen years. He had reached the position of superintendent of motive power with headquarters at Altoona, when he was called to the Burlington in 1886. Altoona is one of the greatest motive power points on the Pennsylvania railroad. There, enough motive power is cared for to move the business of half a dozen small railroad systems. Mr. Rhodes had an important position with the company, which he resigned to become superintendent of motive power on the Q with headquarters at Aurora, Ill. That was in 1886. This position he held for thirteen years. Then he was transferred to Lincoln, where he has since had general supervision of motive power and equipment, as assistant general superintendent. He is a thorough motive power man, is a member of the master car builders' association, and is reckoned as one of the foremost mechanical engineering experts in the United States.

Soon after coming here Mr. Rhodes began the organization of clubs among railroad employes for the discussion and solving of railroad problems. He attended the meetings of these clubs, had accurate minutes kept of the proceedings, saw that these minutes were written out and that each member of the club was presented with a copy. At these meetings Mr. Rhodes would propose problems for discussion and he would listen to the discussion of them by the foremen of the various departments, thereby bringing to his aid as superintendent the consensus of knowledge of all his men. From these club meetings the men began to know Mr. Rhodes, to measure his ability, to learn that he is a master of detail as well as of operation in the abstract.

Mr. Rhodes' headquarters will be in Alliance. His home remains in Lincoln. He is 56 years of age. His hair is whitened, perhaps prematurely. With his white hair hidden, he would be taken for a man not older than 45. He is robust, apparently the possessor of good physical health, a great worker, and a man who prizes discipline and industry highly.

**CHIEF CLERK JOHNSON.**

Mr. Johnson, a relative of Vice President Willard's chief clerk, has been appointed chief clerk for Mr. Rhodes. H. J. German of Lincoln goes to Alliance as assistant to General Superintendent Rhodes.

**ASS'T SUP'T GERMAN.**

H. J. German has been with the Burlington a long time, in fact so long that he hardly remembers when he wasn't working for the company, although he is yet a young man. He came to Lincoln from the position of chief clerk to Superintendent Rogers of Wymore. He

has been in General Superintendent Calvert's office for three years. He has had charge of special work relating to inspection and tonnage problems. While here he has had charge of the tonnage bureau, working out the Hill tonnage idea, and acting in a way as statistician.

The Burlington is building a wing on the depot at Alliance for the office of general superintendent and his assistants.

**SUP'T MAC FARLAND.**

By the shifting of officials and the creation of new territory out of old, Ass't Sup't D. F. MacFarland of Holyoke, Col., is given a boost. He is made division superintendent of the Holyoke division, with headquarters at Holyoke. His division will reach far over into Nebraska, taking the Holdrege-Cheyenne line of the road, the line from Alliance to Sterling, and the Guernsey line from Bridgeport to Guernsey, in all 572 miles. Mr. MacFarland has grown up with the Burlington. He is a brother of the late J. D. MacFarland, so well known in Lincoln. He started in the railroad business as a stake boy with an engineering corps. Successively he filled the position of section foreman, roadmaster and assistant superintendent. He comes of Scotch-Irish Pennsylvania stock. While made superintendent of a division where development of business will be slow and of little consequence, his peculiar abilities in operating lines with the minimum of expense has made his accession to the superintendency of such a division a natural sequence.—Lincoln Journal.
