Receipts of cattle so far this week are 23,800 against 23,500 last week and 22,600 last year. Monday's market was active and firm for everything. Tuesday's trade was steady to strong. Receipts today were 5200. Quality of the beef offered was only fair. Trading opened early and active at strong to 10c higher rates, but closed easy. Cows and heifers were very scarce. Values ruled firm for them. Bulls were strong. Desirable stockers and feeders were steady; others slow to lower. The following table gives quotations now ruling:

Receipts today were 10,400, quality good. 2 1/2 to 5c lower figures were the rule at the beginning of trading but latter bids were mostly 7 1/2 to 10c off. Bulk of sales were from \$5.10 to 5.30; top 5.32 1/2.

Receipts of sheep this week 11,400, last week 11,000, and 13,100 last year. Monday's market was strong to 10c higher. Tuesday's trade was 10 to 15c higher. Receipts today were 4200 and the market active and firm. We quote: Choice lambs, \$7.25 to 7.40; choice yearlings, \$6.50 to 6.60; choice wethers, \$5.75 to 5.85; choice ewes \$5.50 to 5.60.
