McCook, Neb., June 13, 1905.
The board of equalization, composed of the county commissioners, county assessor and county clerk, met for the purpose of equalizing the assessment of 1905. Present, D. A. Waterman, Samuel Premer, and J. H. Bennett, county commissioners; F. P. Eno, county assessor, and E. J. Wilcox, county clerk.
The board commenced the equalization of the assessment for the year 1905, and continued the same throughout the day.
The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

In the matter of the assessment of J. G. Stokes: He was notified to appear and show cause why his grocery stock should not be assessed for the year 1905, and the said J. G. Stokes, being present in person in pursuance to notice given him, the matter of his assessment coming on for hearing before the board, on consideration whereof it is ordered that the assessment of said J. G. Stokes be increased by adding thereto the sum of \$20 as the actual valuation of his stock of groceries for the year 1905.

Franklin, and said First National Bank being present by F. A. Pennell; on due consideration whereof it is ordered by the board that the application of said Citizens Bank and First National Bank be denied, and that the assessed valuation of said Citizens Bank and said First National Bank of McCook as returned by the assessor be approved and confirmed.

The board of equalization met pursuant to adjournment. Present: D. A. Waterman, Samuel Premer and J. H. Bennett, county commissioners; F. P. Eno, county assessor, and E. J. Wilcox, county clerk.
Minutes of previous meeting were read and approved.

The matter of the applications of Patrick Walsh and James I. Lee, coming on for further consideration before the board, it was moved by Bennett and seconded by Wilcox that the assessed valuation of the ice of said Patrick Walsh and also of James I. Lee be reduced to twenty cents per ton. Those voting in favor of said motion being Bennett and Wilcox; those voting against said motion being Waterman, Premer and Eno; motion was thereupon declared lost. It is thereupon ordered by the board that the assessed valuation of the ice of said Patrick Walsh and said James I. Lee as returned by the assessor be approved and confirmed.

The semi-annual report of Flora B. Quick, county superintendent, was examined, approved and ordered placed on file.

The petition of L. J. Holland and others asking for the location of a public road, was read and considered. The board finds that all the requirements of the law have been fully complied with and the public good requires it. On motion the petition was granted and road established as follows: Commencing at the south east corner of the north east quarter of section seventeen (17), thence east to the south east corner of the west half of the north west quarter of section sixteen (16), thence north to the north east corner of the west half of the north west quarter, said section sixteen (16), all in township three (3), range twenty-eight (28), Red Willow county, Nebraska, and terminating thereat, and clerk was instructed to notify overseer of highways to open said road.

Damages by reason of the location of said road were allowed as follows: Jacob Randel claimed \$50, allowed \$48 on west half, north-west quarter, 16-328, and the overseer of road district No. 5 was directed to pay same out of any funds belonging to said district, as by law provided.

Petition of J. M. Brown and others asking for the establishment of a public road was read and considered, the board finds that all owners of land along line of proposed road have given consent thereto in writing. On motion same was granted establishing a public road as follows: Commencing at the south-east corner of the west half, south-east quarter of section 14, township 3, range 27, west of the 6th P. M., running north on the line between the east half of the east half and west half of east half of section 14, township 3, range 27, west of the 6th P. M., and continuing on north on the best practical route near that line until it reaches the main road running in an easterly and westerly direction near the bluffs on the south side of the Republican river and to vacate the road that now runs through the west half of the east half of said section 14, township 3, range 27, west of the 6th P. M., and clerk was instructed to notify overseer of highways to open said road.
