Applies For Divorce.

May Catherine Sharkey began suit against her husband, Bernard J., for divorce yesterday afternoon, alleging extreme cruelty. The couple were married at Elizabethport, N. J., in 1881. There are ten children in the family. Sharkey is Burlington engineer running from Lincoln to McCook. In an affidavit filed with her petition the plaintiff alleges that she and her husband had agreed that he should turn over to her \$100 monthly out of his salary of \$200 with which she was to secure the provisions for the family, running bills at the stores and paying them at the end of each month. Because of her refusal to deed him property in which she alleges she holds title, the wife asserts that Sharkey stopped paying her the monthly allowance about a month ago, and that without warning her of what he intended to do, notified the proprietors of the stores of which she had been a patron, not to grant her further credit. She claims that as a result of this action she was left for several days without food in the house or means with which to obtain it. She relates to the court that on account of the trouble between herself and her husband, she was compelled to borrow the money to start her suit, from her attorney. She asks the court to grant her temporary alimony of \$100 a month till the case can be heard and that on final hearing she may be given the custody of all the children, \$2,000 and title to the house and lots where the family is now living.—Lincoln Journal.
