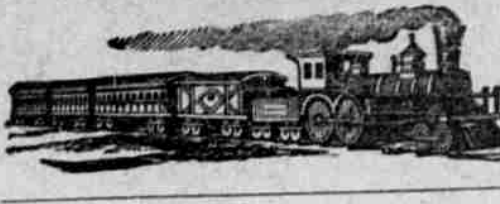

Death of Joseph Miller.

Joseph Miller, one of the oldest residents of Hitchcock county, died rather suddenly, last Thursday evening. He had been ailing for some time with asthmatic trouble, but was able to be up and around until the final summons came. About an hour before he died he sent for Mr. Solomon to make his will, and after finishing the work he walked with Mr. Solomon out in the yard where they talked for a few minutes. When Mr. Solomon returned to town, Mr. Miller sat on the porch, where Mrs. Miller left him to go and milk the cow. Upon her return she found him lying dead where she had left him but a few minutes before. Mr. Miller came and resided on a homestead six miles north of Culbertson, in Blackwood precinct, for a number of years; later he lived over on the Willow for several years and about three years ago he moved to Culbertson. Mr. Miller leaves a wife, two sons and one daughter to mourn his departure. August, the youngest son, is attending business at Beatrice. Frank, the other son, lives on his farm up in Blackwood precinct, seven miles north of Culbertson. Casper Hackenack, the daughter, lives across the Willow in Frontier county about ten miles northeast of this place. Mr. Miller was 63 years old. The funeral was held last Saturday afternoon in the Evangelical church. Sermon was preached by Rev. Rekow.

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Mrs. M. O. Reynolds Called.

Mary O. Reynolds was born, March 13, 1858, in Wylueing, Penn. She was married to M. O. Reynolds, Feb. 25, 1880. This union was blessed with four children—one son and three daughters. She died at her home in Culbertson, Friday, April 19, 1907.

Deceased was a member of the Methodist Episcopal church and the Degree of Honor. The funeral was held, Sunday forenoon, in charge of the Degree of Honor. The church was too small to seat the audience, and many were standing in the aisles and the hall. The sermon was preached by her pastor, Rev. Chader. Text, John 14:2. His outlines were: The Fatherhood of God, the Brotherhood of Man, the Saviorhood of Christ, and the Friendship of the Spirit. Interment was made in Culbertson cemetery. The ceremonies at the grave were conducted by the order and were both beautiful and impressive.

Mrs. Reynolds leaves a husband, one son, three daughters, a father, three sisters, five brothers, and a host of friends to mourn her departure. Mr. Reynolds and family may rest assured that they have the love and sympathy of the entire community.

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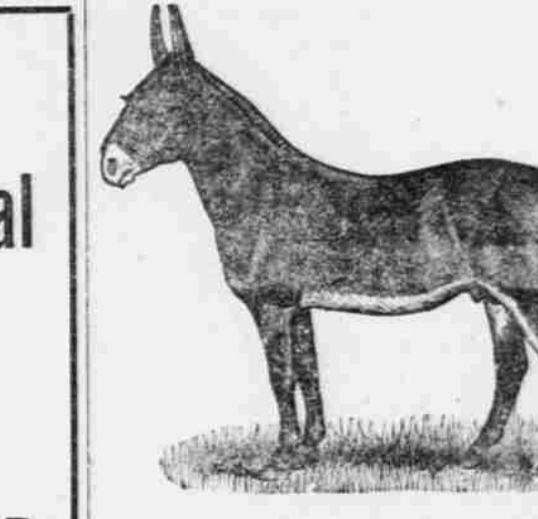
