JUNIOR NORMAL SCHOOL NOTES.

Misfortune seems to be pursuing the Junior Normal entertainment course.

First, Kern failed to come at all; second, the opera house where the entertainments were to be held burned; then the university people failed to measure up to expectations; and lastly, at a critical time at the beginning of the Sunday night concert the lights went out; all of which could not be helped and may be only the promise of a happy ending.

Word was received from the Lincoln headquarters that an additional attraction will be added to the McCook course to make up for Kern's failure to come and the disappointment occasioned by the University Glee Club.

The regular state examinations for county certificates will be held at the Junior Normal School next Friday and Saturday, July 19 and 20.

Magee, lately superintendent of the Ashland schools and in other years a Junior Normal School instructor at Valentine, North Platte and Holdrege, was present and extended cordial greetings and encouragement to the teachers that work here. His address was thoroughly appreciated.

The concert by the Nebraska Concert Company last Saturday night, had to be given in the Methodist church on account of the burning of the Bixler opera house. It was a disappointment to the teachers and people generally because much had been expected in the way of enlivening music from this group of eight young college men, representatives of the University of Nebraska Glee Club. It is true that their program could not be rendered as planned, since the settings of a stage could not be used.

A church rostrum is ill adapted for minstrelsy and light opera. Nevertheless, the company lacked coherence and unity of purpose and definiteness of aim as well as good voices. In further extension of their poor work, it may be said that they left North Platte early Saturday morning, traveling all day and reaching here on belated Number 5. The program of sacred music which was rendered at the Methodist church at the union meeting Sunday night was an improvement over their work of the evening before. Local talent assisted the young men.
