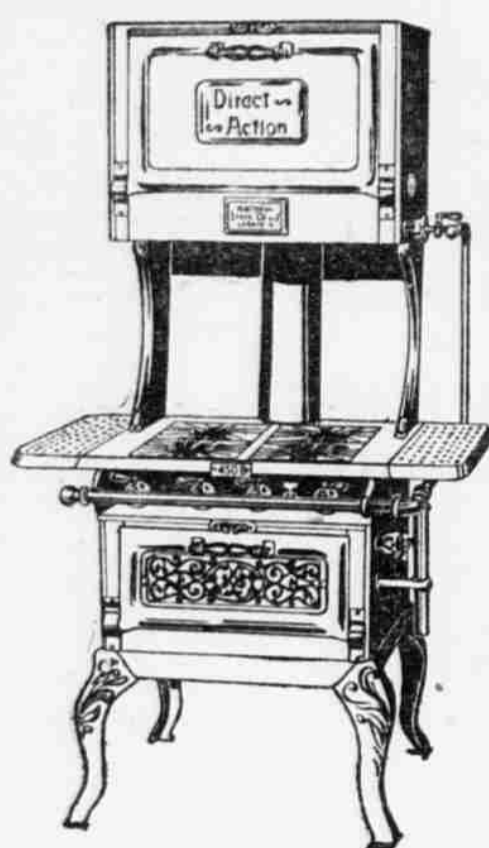

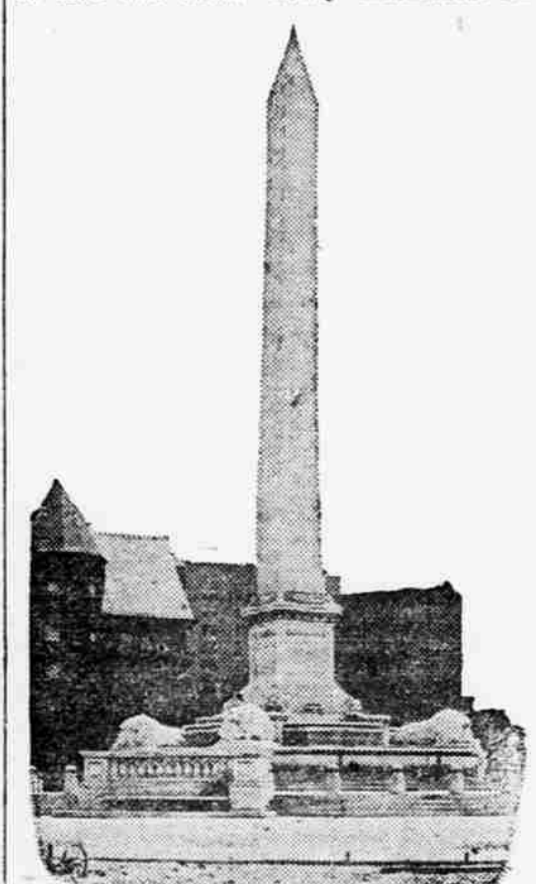
Bubble Blowing.

Buffalo Honors McKinley.

ON Sept. 6 it will be six years since Caelgoes, the anarchist, shot down President McKinley at Buffalo. On Sept. 5, the day preceding the anniversary of the tragedy which plunged the country into mourning, an imposing monument will be unveiled in one of the public squares of the city where he met his death. It is a simple marble shaft, typical of the modesty and sincerity of one of the noblest presidents, while at the base crouch lions, symbols of the kingly dignity and the strength and nobility of the statesman honored in the memorial.

Shortly after the death of Mr. McKinley various projects for the erection of statues and memorials of him were started in different parts of the country. A monument with statue and groups by MacNell was dedicated a few months ago at Columbus, the capital of Ohio. The national memorial at Canton, comprising a splendid mausoleum and a statue of McKinley by Niehaus, the whole costing \$500,000, will be dedicated the latter part of September. In other places memorials to McKinley in the form of statues have been erected. The Buffalo monument is different from any other planned or executed in honor of this statesman. At the time of his death it was thought that something ought to be done to commemorate his character in the city where he met his tragic fate. It happened that after paying all its expenses for building and exhibits at the Pan-American exposition the state of New York had left of its appropriation for that purpose a sum amounting to \$100,000. Instead of turning this back into the treasury of the commonwealth the legislature ordered that it be used in the erection of a monument to commemorate the dead president's character in the city where he finished his useful career. Much time was consumed in discussion of the form the memorial should take, the drawing of plans, etc., but since the character of the monument was decided on the work upon it has gone forward rapidly. It will be the finest mortuary monument in America. It is not the most costly memorial in

honor of a famous man, but as a shaft of commemoration, in distinction from a mausoleum, it will stand without a rival in any city of America, perhaps of the world. The Grant monument in New York is properly called "Grant's tomb." It cost about \$500,000, which is the same as the cost of the McKinley mausoleum at Canton. The tomb of Napoleon in Paris is, as its name indicates, a tomb and not a monument. The Taj Mahal in India and other famous structures are examples of that kind of memorial.

The McKinley monument cannot be compared to any of these and is a unique work in its way. Niagara

square, where it stands, is about 500 feet in diameter and is approached by streets at no less than eight different points, and the trees lining these streets form eight charming vistas through which the monument may be seen. John M. Carrere, architect of the monument, who is familiar with the principal monumental structures of the world, says he knows of none which has a site so advantageous in this respect. The shaft, of the purest Vermont marble, is sixty-nine feet in height and rests on a base twenty-four feet in height. The lions at the four corners are the work of the noted animal sculptor, A. Phimister Proctor of New York, who modeled the figures after study of Sultan, the splendid lion of the Bronx zoological park in New York. The park surrounding the monument has been beautified at a considerable expense to the city of Buffalo. Facing the square in the center of which the monument stands is the house once occupied by President Millard Fillmore. It is expected that the other president given to the nation by Buffalo, Grover Cleveland, will participate in the dedication ceremonies. The committee hopes for the presence of President Roosevelt also. The exercises will be the leading feature of Buffalo's "old home week." Nowhere is the memory of Mr. McKinley held in greater regard than in Buffalo. The sad scenes attending his assassination have left an impression never to be obliterated, and the noble monument erected in his honor is a fitting expression of the affection and veneration with which his memory is cherished.
