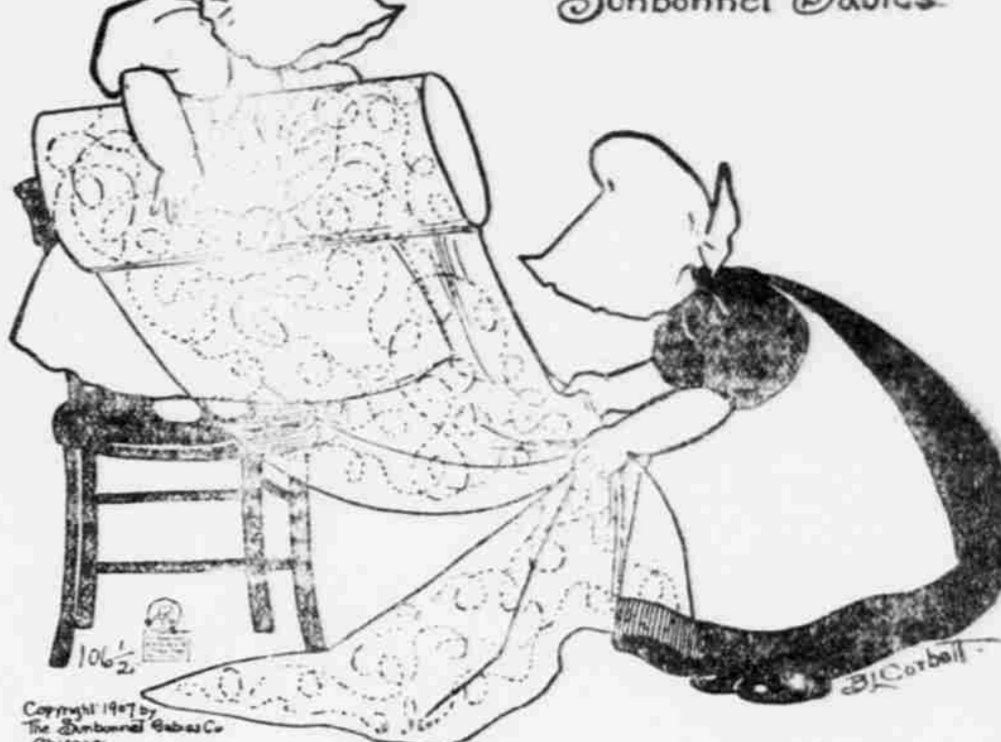
Special Children's Day exercises at the Fowler school house, next Sunday.
