Death of E. A. Dodge.

Elisha A. Dodge, father of Mrs. M. E. Hartman, passed away at his bome 8 miles southwest of McCook, Monday

Funeral services were held at the farm home, Tuesday morning at 10 o'clock, conducted by Rev. Bryant I owe, after which the remains were brought to Mc-Cook and interred in Riverview ceme-

Elisha A Donge was forn in Crawford Co., Pa., Oct. 1, 1835. In that state and New York he spent his boyhood and early manhood.

At the age of twenty eight, on June 24 1863, he was married to Liva Pixhy t Oneida, N. Y. After a short resiornce there the young couple moved to Lumois, not far from Galesburg. Here was born the first child a daughter, who at an early age was taken home. Later they mayed to La Seuer Co., Minn , just after the great Indian out break. Here was born the last child, another daughter, Myrile. From here be moved his family to Kansas, near Hutchinson, crassing the prairies as before in a covered wagon. Here they settled down on a homestead, enduring the hardships of a pioneer life and a residence thurty-five miles from a railroad. Thence they moved to Iowa, to Missonri and in 1899 came to Red Willow county. Here the loving w fe and mother after a largering illness followed the daughter home

Since that time the father has resided with the young r daughter Mrs. M. E. Hartman, who was permitted to admin-Ena and Miss Carolyn Collicott visited ister to him in his last short illness

Besides rearing his own family he took into his kind heart and generous home an adopted boy, Bert, who with the grandchildren were with him when he jassed away, December 27, aged 74 years, 2 months, 27 days

He has been a member of the M. E. church since early manhood, a sincere christian, a fond father and husband, a beloved "Grandpa" to all who knew him, always forbearing and kind and above all patient

Besides the son and caughter and three grandchildren residing hers thera are left one brother and several sisters to mourn his loss.
