McCOOK TO GET \$95,000.

The Omnibus Public Buildings and Grounds Bill Introduced in Congress Carries That Amount for McCook's Public Building.

(From a Staff Correspondent.) WASHINGTON, D. C., June 19 .-(Special Telegram.)—After weeks of consideration, given to the demands of congressmen for sites for public buildings in their districts, Chairman Bartholdt, of the public buildings and grounds committee of the house, reported Saturday the omnibus public buildings and ground bill which will

be taken up Monday for consideration carrying an appropriation of \$19,288, 500 with \$3,095,000 for continuing contracts. Chairman Bartholdt has had numerous conferences with the president and cabinet, as to the need of the departments of government for in-

creased housing. What to do with Norris of the fifth

Nebraska district was a question which met the chairman early in the preliminary consideration of the bill for Judge Norris had been a former member of the committee and a most efficient member.
