Wealth in Irrigation Congress has just appropriated Twenty Million Dollars to hasten the work of Government irrigation. The Government Shoeshone Project in THE BIG HORN BASIN will receive its share and be pushed to completion at once. Contracts for a twelve mile extension of the main canal were let June 27th. More than 150 farms now ready for settlers, and a large number of farms are now being surveyed, which will be opened to entry within a few weeks. These rich lands, irrigated by the Government, can be homesteaded by simply repaying the Government actual cost—\$45 per acre, in ten yearly payments, without interest. 15,000 acres of Carey Act Lands just opened to entry—only 30 days residence required. Under this law settlers buy water from the irrigation company at \$50 per acre, and the land from the State at 50c per acre, paying \$10 per acre cash, the remainder running over a period of ten years at six per cent.
