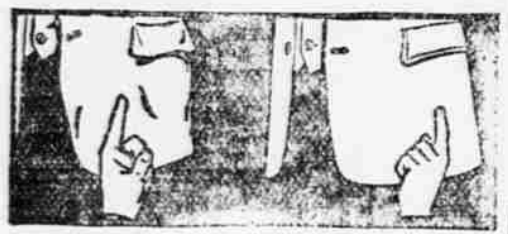

On motion the county treasurer was instructed to refund to A. R. McHaffey the sum of \$2.00, being the amount of 1910 poll tax illegally assessed against him and paid by him under protest, for the reason that he is over 50 years of age.
The claim of Guy G. Peugh, of \$150, for putting up booths in Indianola Precinct, at the primary election, was on motion rejected.
The clerk having advertised for sealed bids for the building of steel and wooden bridges in the county for the coming year, and November 16, 1910, at 2 o'clock P. M., being the time set for the opening of said bids, the board proceeded to open the bids on file.
The board found the bids of Roberts, Illings & Lee, of Minneapolis, Minn., of the Standard Bridge Co. of Omaha, of the Empire Bridge Co. of Falls City, Nebraska, of C. H. Williams of Omaha and of the Western Bridge and Construction Co. of Omaha, on file.
After due consideration of all bids, by the board, a motion was made by Lofton, seconded by Sughroue, that we accept the bid of the Standard Bridge Co. as the lowest and best, and enter into a yearly contract with them. The roll-call was ordered and resulted as follows:
