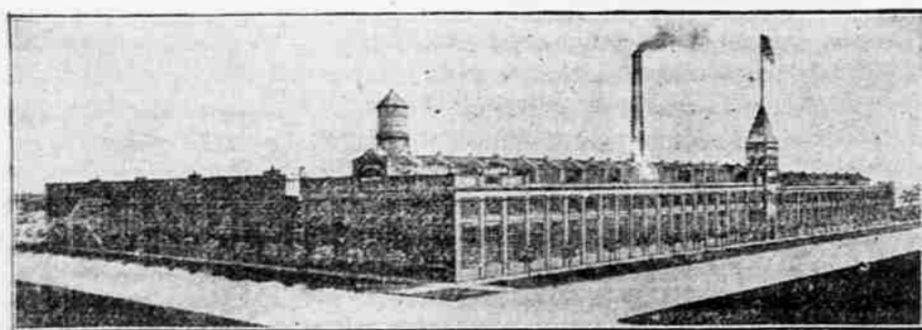

Organize a Circuit.

Representatives from Atwood, Alma, Beaver City, Benkelman, Indianola day afternoon to form a circuit for and Imperial met in McCook yesterday fair and races.

After considerable discussion, four of the six counties went into a circuit and the following tentative dates were determined upon:

Atwood, September 5th.
Beaver City, September 12th.
Alma, September 19th.
Indianola, September 26th.

Benkelman and Imperial could not see their way clear to go into the association. Nor was McCook prepared to enter. However, all of these will doubtless have fairs and races, coming fall, and may be able to decide upon some concerted endeavor in this matter.

Those participating in the conference were: Morse of Benkelman; Munger of Atwood; Moore of Alma; Ryan of Indianola; Souffe of Imperial, and Phillips of Beaver City.

As for McCook, the most difficult problem to solve is the location. The present race track grounds are not accessible. It seems to be agreed among those who are interested that the first step toward a permanent county fair and racing association is the organization of a company or a corporation and the purchase of a location.

This idea could possibly be developed along with a park proposition thus in due course of time the city could secure a permanent fair ground and park facilities.

A sentiment is forming among some of our business men that such an organization should be effected and the serious work begun of securing a permanent location which can be developed and improved as means are available.

Action at Auto Show.

Manufacturers of standard makes of automobiles are planning an unusual demonstration in Omaha the week of February 20 to 25 when the Sixth annual automobile show will be held in the auditorium.

This demonstration has been arranged to give visitors the most minute knowledge of machines. Cylinders cut in half will be operated by electric motors which will enable visitors to see just what happens in the cylinders; transmission cases will be open and running that their action may be studied; other machines will be taken apart and shown in pieces like holding an autopsy over a motor car.

The Nebraska and Iowa exhibitors have picked the best types of cars for the Omaha show and the entry list has increased in a week from thirty-six makes of cars to sixty-one. When it is considered that only ninety-six makes of cars were shown in Chicago, the Omaha show is growing when sixty-one makes will be shown. Many cars were exhibited in Chicago which will not be shown in Omaha, being impractical and unknown cars. All the makes to be shown in Omaha are standard cars.

Invitations have been sent out to agents and car owners by the distributors for Iowa and Nebraska to come to Omaha next week and be their guests.

Many exhibits are arriving in Omaha and by the time set for the opening a great display will be installed. The management has secured a thirty piece band to furnish music afternoon and evening, thereby adding to the attraction of the show.
