### TO SURVEY THE STATE AUTOMOBILE ROAD.

On Tuesday morning, July 18, the company which has been employed by the Omaha-Denver good roads association to prepare the official map and guide of the Omaha-Denver transcontinental route, will start on its survey from Omaha.

The surveying party will consist of an engineer, who will sketch the entire route in detail, showing all crooks, turns, bridges, streams, farm dwellings, wind mills, barns, school houses, churches, etc., along the route. A newspaper reporter who will furnish the "write up" of the different towns and places of interest. A photographer to take pictures of various streams, dwellings, etc. A good roads lecturer to give a short talk at each town through which they pass, together with several others prominent in affairs in Nebraska, the officers of the good roads' association and automobile clubs throughout the state.

The surveying party will travel by automobiles and along the entire route it is intended to make this trip a "booster" for "good roads."

## A Smart Design for Afternoon Wear

A MODISH dress of serge, cut on tailored lines, seems the most practical investment for the woman of moderate means. Nothing is more fitting for shopping, informal afternoon calls or general street wear, and really covers so many needs. Many of the avenue shops are showing most attractive walking dresses in white serge with a pencil stripe of black and with a piping or collar of black satin.

The illustrated model would be a smart design for developing navy blue or cream serge or mohair, with the side-front closing piped with black satin. The dress could be worn effectively with a side jabot of lace or batiste or a sash of satin, fastened at the neck, passing under the tabs at the closing and finish with a tassel or fringe. To give an overblouse effect the under section of the sleeve could be made of a fine net and the dress worn with a chemise of the net. For a wash dress linen, cotton repp or poplin would make a practical model for summer and for traveling, foulard or pongee. For a medium size woman a dress like this would require about seven yards of serge or eight yards of linen.

## CALL FOR REPUBLICAN COUNTY CONVENTION.

The republicans of Red Willow county are hereby called to meet in convention in the city of Indianola, on Wednesday, July 19th at 2 o'clock in the afternoon, for the purpose of electing eight (8) delegates to the republican state convention to be held at Lincoln on July 25th, 1911, and for the purpose of electing a county central committee, and for the transaction of such other business as may properly come before said county convention.

The convention shall be made up of delegates chosen by the republicans of the respective precincts of the county on the basis of one delegate at large for each voting precinct of the county and one delegate for each 15 votes or fraction thereof cast for C. H. It is recommended that no proxies be allowed, but that the delegates present from each precinct be authorized to cast the full vote of such precinct.

It is ordered that precinct caucuses to elect delegates be held on Wednesday, July 12th, at such hour and place as the precinct committee shall designate, and that the several precinct committees shall at once call such caucuses and give notice thereof by posting or publication.

It is suggested that the precinct caucuses nominate precinct officers at these caucuses and that such business be included in the call for the caucus.
