Council Meeting.

The mayor and council of the City of McCook met in regular session, at the city hall, August 28th. Present, Mayor McAdams, Councilmen Middleton, Stansberry, Brown and Woods; City Attorney Wolff, and City Clerk Stoll. Minutes of last meeting read and approved. Moved by Councilman Middleton seconded by Councilman Stansberry, that the proposition of the state treasurer to buy unsold water bonds at reduction of interest to 5 per cent, until end of optional period as set out in his letter of August 19, 1911, to city attorney, be and is hereby accepted, and letter of city attorney dated August 25th, to state treasurer, written by order of the mayor, is hereby ratified. Motion carried.

Moved by Councilman Stansberry and seconded by Councilman Brown, that petition for electric lights presented by property holders on 4th street west (C. S. Mullen et al.) be passed and approved with the addition of one light. One light to be placed at corner of F and 4th street west, one at G and 4th street west, one at C and 4th street west, and one at 10th and B street in West McCook. Motion carried.

It was moved by Councilman Brown, seconded by Councilman Middleton, that the following bills, being approved by the finance committee, be allowed and warrants drawn for same. Carried.

Petition of Charles Bailey requesting transfer of permit to conduct pool hall was read. Motion made and seconded to grant it was carried. Bond for same was read and approved.

Ordinance No. 206 was passed and approved.

G. A. Folden presented his proposition to furnish garbage cans for use on the business street, which was referred to committee of Councilman Brown and Woods.

Petition of Chas. E. Picklum for permit to construct gasoline tank under walk was read and granted.

Petition of Mesdames Mills, Rosebush and Vierson, for sidewalk, was referred to committee on sidewalks.

Motion was made and carried that city electrician be asked to submit an estimate of the cost of poles and wiring for city electric light plant.

Moved by Councilman Stansberry and seconded by Councilman Brown that resolution be adopted providing for paying city firemen as follows: \$1.00 for the first hour or fractional part thereof, and for all additional time at the rate of \$1.00 per hour. This compensation applies only when it is necessary to turn on water and use it for fires. Motion carried unanimously.

The druggists' liquor reports of L. W. McConnell, C. R. Woodworth and A. McMillen were read and filed. Motion made and carried to adjourn.

Co. Commissioners' Proceedings

McCook, Nebraska, August 23, 1911. The board of county commissioners met pursuant to adjournment. Present: F. S. Lofton, Edward Sughroue and W. N. Rogers, county commissioners; Chas. D. Ritchie county attorney, and Chas. Skalla, county clerk.

The board proceeded to view roads and bridges in Willow Grove, Red Willow, Fritsch and Box Elder precincts, and adjourned to meet August 24, 1911.

McCook, Nebraska, August 24, 1911. The Board of County Commissioners met pursuant to adjournment. Present: F. S. Lofton, Edward Sughroue and W. N. Rogers, county commissioners; Chas. D. Ritchie, county attorney, and Chas. Skalla, county clerk.

It appearing to the board that a vacancy exists in the office of justice of peace for Willow Grove precinct caused by the removal of P. S. Heaton, the board decided to appoint a justice of peace to fill said vacancy. Chairman Lofton proposed J. S. McBrayer for said position. The roll call was ordered and resulted:

Yeas: Lofton, Sughroue, Rogers, 3. Nays: None. J. S. McBrayer was declared appointed.

A motion was made by Sughroue, that the claim of Mrs. Ella Lee for \$4.00, for house rent, be disallowed, for the reason that the original claim was \$14.00 and the county had paid her \$10.00, the maximum amount to be paid per month for house rent for paupers. The roll call was ordered and resulted:

Yeas: Lofton, Sughroue, 2. Nays: Rogers, 1. Motion was declared carried.

The claim of L. M. Higgins for \$62.04 for fees in five insanity cases was allowed at \$46.62, \$15.42 being deducted for fees claimed in the Doyle insanity case deduction being made for the reason that Wm. Doyle had paid all the fees in said case to said L. M. Higgins, sheriff, and the county board hereby asks said L. M. Higgins to refund to the county the \$12.00 expense money advanced by the treasurer in said case.

Sughroue presented the following resolution:

Whereas Phebe J. Taylor has taken an appeal to the district court of this county from the action of this board on the twenty-third day of August, 1910 concerning her claim for damages caused by the location of road No. 431, which said case is now pending the said district court.

And, whereas, said Phebe J. Taylor has offered to compromise said claim and settle same upon the county of Red Willow paying the court costs and paying the sum of two hundred dollars to said Phebe J. Taylor and allowing said Phebe J. Taylor to construct at her expense across said road a cattle pass under the supervision of the county commissioners and in such a way as not to interfere with or endanger the public in the use of said road.

Now, therefore be it resolved, that said offer be accepted, and said claim be compromised and allowed at the sum of two hundred dollars; that the costs of said appeal be paid by said county and that said Phebe J. Taylor be allowed to build said cattle pass.

Rogers seconded this resolution.

The roll call was ordered and resulted as follows:

Yeas: Lofton, Sughroue, Rogers, 3. Nays: None. Resolution was declared carried.

On motion the county treasurer was instructed to refund to Mrs. Ella Lee the sum of \$16.80, being amount illegally assessed against Cook Addition to McCook City, a part of block 14, of West Me in 1910, and paid by her under protest, for the reason that two houses were assessed on said tract, while it only contained one.

The claim of E. E. DeLong, of \$9.45, asking for a refund of 1910 personal taxes for the reason that

he was not the owner of the property assessed at the time of assessment, was on motion, disallowed.

The claim of the Danbury News of \$1.25 for printing equalization notice was allowed, but ordered applied on the credit due the county from said Danbury News for the overcharge on a former claim.
