—Ben Crawley is enjoying a few days at the state fair, going down last night on 10.

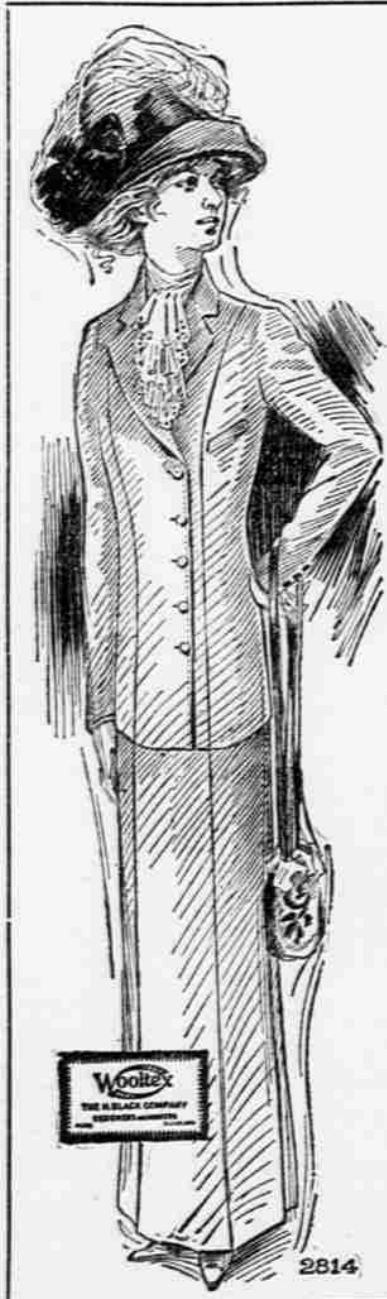
—O. M. McClure is well enough to go down to Franklin for a few days on a visit.
