 The Omaha Bee says: A clean sweep of the state by the republican ticket is indicated by the returns in the election of supreme judges and regents of the university. The vote on railway commissioner is close and Hall, republican, in nineteen counties is running behind Harman.
 The Lincoln Journal says: On railway commissioner, Hall in 22 counties has gained over Clarke's vote of a year ago about 5,200 votes. He is 2,500 votes ahead of Harman with more than one-third of the entire vote of the state reported. In these counties Hayden a year ago was 3,000 in the lead of Clarke and the latter won out by 3,200 votes. This would make it appear that the remainder of the state on commissioner will show increased Republican gains for Hall.

 Returns in are rather favorable to the Democrats and Socialist gains are marked features. Although some Republican gains have been made in eastern states and in decided reduction of Democratic majorities of last year.
