"Resolve, that the order made by this board on March 22, 1911, establishing road 438, be declared final, and the county clerk is hereby instructed to notify the overseers of highways to open said road, without waiting for any further notice from Hitchcock county."

On motion the board adjourned to meet December 5, 1911.

An Unusual Case.

The kidnapping case in which a man named Fitzgerald figured as defendant has just been settled. The result is that Fitzgerald has just been sentenced to the penitentiary for a term of 2 to 3 years. This is the first case of the kind to be tried in Nebraska.
