Political and official Washington are still gasping over Postmaster General Hitchcock's announcement favoring government ownership of telegraph and telephone lines. Why not express, too?

Representative Maguire has introduced a measure in congress providing for government aid for state fairs. The bill provides for an appropriation of \$100,000 for this purpose and that the government shall have room for a suitable exhibit.

The rural parcels post proposition is up, again, with prospect of becoming law. It is proposed to try out both rural and city parcels post before suggesting a general parcels post law. A rural parcels post ought to result advantageously to town and rural life, while a general parcels post would be damaging and to the interest of the great city centers.

The construction of an ocean-to-ocean "national old trails road," to embrace the Braddock road, Cumberland road, national pike, Boone's Lick road, Santa Fe trail, Kearney's road, Oregon trail and other famous highways of the early days, was proposed in a bill introduced Tuesday by Representative Beard of Missouri. It would provide a six-foot highway from Washington to San Francisco and Olympia, Wash., the cost to be equally divided between the federal and state governments.
