Chinese Fossil Teeth.

Dr. Max Schlosser has made a singular collection of fossil teeth from drug stores in various parts of China, where they are sold under the name of dragons' teeth, and are valued for their supposed curative powers. Upon examining them Dr. Schlosser found that they are the remains of many species of extinct animals, such as the ancestral forms of camels, saber-toothed tigers, three-toed horses and other creatures of ancient times, some of which, like the ancestral forms of camels and antelopes, were supposed to have had their original home in America and in Africa. Judging from the quantities of these teeth sold, Dr. Schlosser thinks they must exist in enormous numbers in some parts of the Chinese empire.—Kansas City Journal.

Longest Road in the World.

In 1901 the great Siberian railway was thrown open to the public. There was then in operation a total of 1,444 miles in Manchuria and 3,559 miles in Siberia, a continuous Russian line from Moscow to Port Arthur of 5,429 miles; and the new trains de luxe, which will begin running this summer, will give virtually a through service from Paris to Port Arthur, a distance of 7,299 miles, 6,600 miles of which is over Russian lines.—Century.
