It would be well for them to look about in order that their votes be cast intelligently, and patriotically. This country has made wonderful strides in the past half century. It has grown from a nation torn by sectional strife and internecine war to the most powerful nation of the world. Its continued existence has ceased to be a debatable question while its position on matters of international concern is a subject of moment to every civilized power. It is at once the hope of the oppressed of every land and the fear of every despot who sees in its great progress an indication of a higher civilization which claims for itself individual opportunity unhampered and unrestrained.

All this and much more has been the result of but fifty years of national life.

The part which political parties have taken in this development

should be a subject of inquiry with every first voter

For the past fifty years the democratic party has been successful in the election of a President but twice, and during the whole of the eight years of President Cleveland's regime the republican party has had control of one or both branches of congress. What democratic measure can you name that has advanced the interest of this nation or its people.

Every enactment political or social in its nature that has been instrumental in promoting the growth of America for fifty years is the result and the work of the political organization known as the republican party. The war of the rebellion; the reconstruction of the nation, the homestead act, the resumption of specie payment; the protective tariff; the gold standard; the Treaty of Paris with its consequent retention of the Philippine Islands, the ownership of Hawaii and Porto Rico, the scheme of national irrigation and the building of the Panama Canal were all accomplished by the republican party and all opposed by the democratic party. These have been the great factors in American progress and in them democracy has had no voice save that of opposition. To which of these organizations will you belong young man? You want to start right. You want to make the most of your right of franchise. How will you exercise it? With that party which has done things or with that party which has opposed their doing?
