Richardson county farmers have been getting the top of the market on hogs and cattle for years and now they are taking down the prizes in the show ring. A reporter had the pleasure of visiting the beautiful farm of Henry Felderman in Nemaha precinct this week and saw a herd of short horns headed by a Cruikshank bull that is as fine a sight as one could wish to see. Not only does Mr. Felderman raise fine cattle, but his hogs are at the top of the heap. One hundred and eighty head of hogs have been shipped from this farm this season and four hundred and seventy five

head are now feeding. Mr. Felderman raised and fed six thousand bushels of corn this year and purchased thirteen thousand bushels for this purpose of his neighbors. This is the seasons record of one of Richardson county's farmers who knows how to do things and does them well.
