She was educated in Brownell Hall, Omaha, Neb., and at the Cook County normal at Englewood, Ill. She taught school at LaGrange, Ill., for several years, going from there to Cleveland, Ohio where she taught in the public schools. Thence she went to Buffalo, N. Y. where she had charge of the kindergarten department of a fashionable young ladies seminary. While in the last named city she met Dr. John Hall to whom she was married in Falls City in the year 1898. With her husband she lived in Greely Col., for two years after which time Dr. Hall accepted a position as member of the faculty of Columbia university in New York City, at this place Mrs. Hall died. The immediate cause of her death was an operation for appendicitis. Mrs. Hall, or Cornelia as her many friends love to remember her was one of the most cultured and lovable ladies that Falls City has ever claimed. Her death was a great shock to the entire community.
