O. P. Billings, representative from the 52nd district in the state legislature, has introduced the following

House Roll No. 2, to amend and repeal Sec. 16 of Chap. 80, Compiled Statutes of Nebraska, providing that school land shall revert to the state on failure of lessor to pay interest.

H. R. No. 57 to repeal sections 1 to 36, inclusive, of Chap. 2, entitled 'Russian Thistles."

H. R. No. 58, to amend and repeal Sec. 127 of Chap. 77 relating to a county treasurer's deed for taxes.

Mr. Billings has been appointed chairman of the committee on school lands and funds.
