Last Thursday Douglas county sold two batches of bonds, one of the issues being for \$100,000 and the other for \$180,000. The \$100,000 lot brought a premium of \$6,850 from the state board of educational lands and funds, and a Toledo man offered \$7,225 premium. The \$180,000 lot were sold to a Chicago firm for a premium of \$15, 327. Twenty bidders were present at the sale. This doesn't look as though the "demo-pop" administration had destroyed the credit of the state, as we were told it would do.






