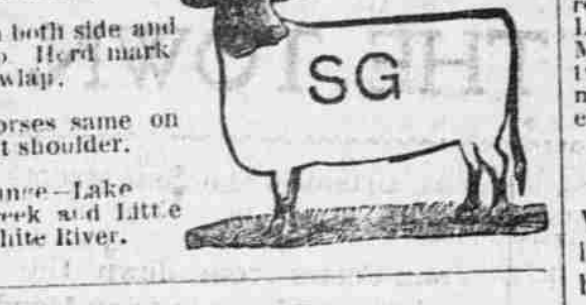

Geo. H. Hill Gallop Neb Range 10 miles Merriman



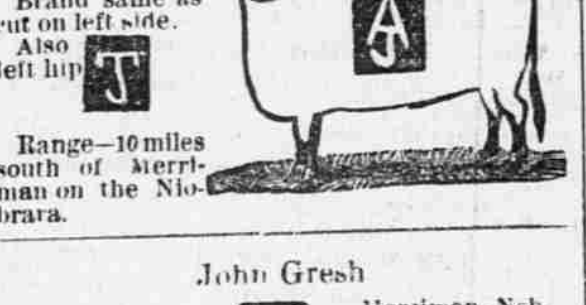
Seth Gary. Merriman, Neb. On both side and hip. Head marked with.



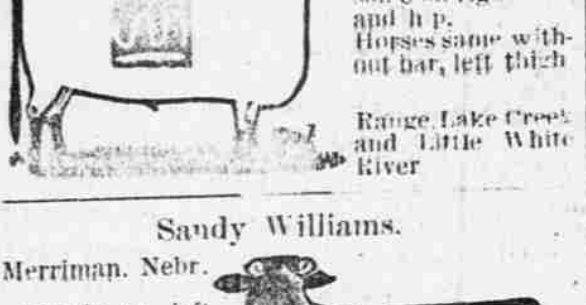
George Gray. Theford Neb Same as cut on left hip or AG on right hip or side.



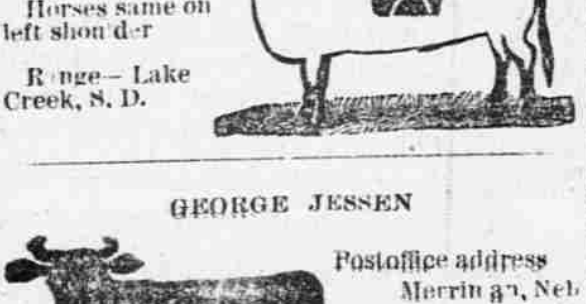
