Funeral of N. Hills.

Norfolk, Dec. 27.—The funeral of the late N. Hills was held today from the undertaking parlors of Sessions & Bell, at 11 o'clock. The body reposed in an elegant, silver trimmed, black casket, which was literally covered with fresh cut flowers, a beautiful cluster of half blown white roses lying immediately above the breast, with pink and white carnations covering to the feet and in the midst of which lay a silver plate with the words "At Rest" engraved thereon. His intimate friends, knowing his extraordinary love for flowers did not forget to present them upon this the last sad opportunity.

The funeral services were conducted by the Revs. G. H. Main and S. F. Sharpless, assisted by a male quartet which opened the exercises by singing "Rock of Ages" and closed with "Jesus Lover of My Soul," after which the audience was permitted to view the remains. It was very noticeable and remarked upon with what perfect repose the features appeared, a little more than the usual paleness being about all to distinguish it from being a peaceful sleep. The following was read as an obituary:

Norman Hills died in Norfolk, Neb., on Dec. 24, 1900, aged 76 years. Deceased was a native of Massachusetts. He was at one time engaged in business at Sycamore, Ill., after which he removed to Chicago, where he remained several years, and became quite wealthy. The great Chicago fire, however, caught him without insurance protection and left him comparatively a poor man. Later he was located at Belle Plain, Iowa, from which place he came to Norfolk about 1885 where he has since remained in business as a real estate broker.

Having no relatives here, not very much is known of his family history, yet it is understood that he did have two sons and two daughters but their whereabouts is unknown. One sister, living in Canon City, Col., is the only relative heard from since his death, besides which he has at least one other sister living in Massachusetts and one in California.

As a citizen Mr. Hills was exemplary and moral, and inspired his most intimate acquaintances with the strongest ties of friendship.

As a business man he was of the strictest integrity and upright, dealing with the utmost fairness with everyone and while possessed of great energy and activity yet his declining years while a resident of Norfolk precluded the possibility of his making a great financial success. He was, however, keenly alive to matters of public enterprise and not only loyal to the interests of Norfolk, but has been an important factor in the upbuilding and growth of the city.

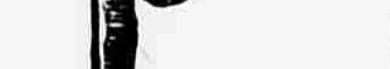
