CLOSE OF THE FISCAL YEAR.

Council is Busy Settling City Affairs.

REPORTS OF CITY OFFICERS.

Chief of Police Widaman and Chief of Fire Department Winter Present Interesting Statistics—Numerous Bills are Allowed and Committee Reports Received.

The city council met in regular session last evening, with Mayor Robertson and Councilmen Brummond, Degner, Grant, Heckman, Spellman and Uhle present. Absent Bullock.

Minutes of the meeting of April 30 were read and approved. The special committee on the proposed extension of the water mains on Philip avenue reported as follows:

To the Honorable Mayor and City Council of Norfolk, Nebraska: Your committee appointed to investigate the water extension on Philip avenue report that we have carefully examined the route proposed and find that the number of water consumers will warrant the extension, and we further find that the extension is a necessity for the additional protection of the schoolhouse on said street. The route proposed is as follows: Beginning at the intersection of Ninth street and Philip avenue, running thence west three blocks, thence north to the corner of Madison avenue and Twelfth street. In accordance with the figures made on the extension several years ago, which comprised several blocks, the present extension will cost about \$700 and inasmuch as the city clerk informs us that after paying all bills against the water fund there will be a balance on hand of about \$1200 we recommend that the extension be made at once.

AUGUST BRUMMOND, OSCAR UHLE, J. C. SPELLMAN, Committee.

On motion the report of the committee was adopted.

The special committee, appointed to investigate and examine with the aid of an expert the condition of the small pump at the pumping station, reported that they had employed Mr. Stewart to examine the pump and that he thought that probably the boring of the cylinders was not quite straight, but after using for a few days would be all right and that later he would make a more extended examination.

On motion the report of the committee was accepted.

Petition of Burt Mapes for permission to erect a one-story solid brick, metal roof building, 40 by 80 feet on the south end of the west 32 feet and east eight feet of lot 3, block 3, in Mathewson's addition was presented and read. On motion the request was granted.

The police judge's report for April, showing total fines assessed and collected \$2, was read and on motion placed on file.

J. M. Covert, dog tax collector, presented the following report for the past year:

Number of dogs tax was collected on, 104. Amount collected, \$209. Amount paid city treasurer, \$201. Commission on last four tax, 4. Amount due city now in hand, 4.

Number of dogs in city not collected for, 50. Number of dogs sent to country for the summer, 30. Number of dogs killed, 25. Number of notices served, 10.

On motion the report of J. M. Covert, dog tax collector, was accepted and placed on file.

The report of H. W. Winter, chief of the fire department, was presented and read, as follows:

To the Honorable Mayor and Members of the City Council of Norfolk, Nebraska—I beg leave to submit the following report of the Norfolk Fire Department and other matters in connection therewith:

FIRST. The water works system, consists of one duplex compound Knudsen pump,

with a capacity of 8,000,000 gallons every 24 hours. Also one duplex Knudsen pump with a capacity of 100,000 gallons every 24 hours; for water supply two wells, one 230 feet deep with six-inch pipe and the other 125 feet deep; the six-inch well with a capacity of 600 gallons per minute and the other with a capacity of 1,000,000 gallons per day; the steam supply is furnished by two boilers of 40 horse power each.

We have about 8 miles of water main and 83 hydrants. Our stand pipe is 110 feet situated on a hill 100 feet above the city making a total height of 210 feet. The stand pipe has a diameter of 12 feet with a capacity of 93,000 gallons. We have a stand pipe pressure of 75 to 90 pounds, with direct pressure for fire purposes of 150 pounds. We also have 25 gate valves.

SECOND. The membership of this department is as follows: Consisting of five companies with a total membership of 100 active members. We have one hook and ladder truck, four hose carts and 2,000 feet of hose, total value of fire apparatus is \$4,400.

The fire department responded to two fires during the fiscal year causing a loss of \$2,300 of which \$2,000 was covered by insurance, leaving a loss not covered by insurance of \$300. In addition the department responded to a number of alarms outside the city limits. The total expense to the city of the Norfolk Fire department has been \$25 for hauling fire apparatus.

The department is in need of at least 1,200 feet of hose and a record book and we respectfully ask that an appropriation be made to furnish the above supplies.

In concluding this, my annual report, I wish to extend to the officers of this department my sincere thanks for the faithful manner in which they have performed their duty pertaining to this department during the year; I also extend to the honorable mayor and city council my sincere thanks for the many kindnesses shown me and the fire department while in the discharge of their duties; the willingness to aid us in furnishing such needed improvements as the organization of this department has demanded from time to time has been very satisfactory to me and should be appreciated by all of the citizens interested in the welfare of this department; my thanks are extended to all persons with whom I have been associated in the performance of my official duties as chief of the Norfolk Fire department.

On motion the report of H. W. Winter, chief of the fire department, was accepted and placed on file.

On motion the thanks of the mayor and council were extended to Chief Winter for the faithful manner in which he had discharged his duties during his term of office.

W. H. Widaman, chief of police and street commissioner, presented the following annual report:

To the Honorable Mayor and City Council of Norfolk, Nebraska—Gentlemen: I herewith hand you my report as chief of police and street commissioner, from May 1, 1900, to April 30, 1901.

Total, 78. In addition there have been one hundred and twenty-five (125) persons given lodging in the city jail over night that were without money and no place to stay, and about the same number of bums and other suspicious characters compelled to leave the city.

During the year have been quarantined: Scarlet fever, 10. Diphtheria, 2. Smallpox suspect, 1. Total, 13.

Total, \$537 23. CASH RECEIPTS AS ABOVE: Received from sidewalk repairs, \$39 66. Received for poll tax, 25 87. Paid for street labor, 27 75.

Total, \$93 28. For the information of mayor and city council I herewith give the following:

Within the past two weeks I have gone over the streets and sidewalks of the city on a tour of inspection for the purpose of ascertaining what improvements should be made on the streets at the present time, and reporting the same.

I find of the 180 wooden street crossings about 50 in more or less bad condition, and of the 85 wood culverts about 10 of no service, and about the same number will soon have to be replaced.

I would recommend that as soon as required wooden culverts be replaced with sewer pipe, and wooden cross walks replaced with stone. The average life of wooden culverts and wooden crossings is not more than five years, and the difference of cost of wooden and stone crossings is very little, and the cost of wooden culverts and sewer pipe is about the same.

Sidewalks in many places are in need of being re-built, and I would recommend brick for walks. Cost about the same as wooden walks. There has been a great improvement in putting a large number of brick walk in the past year in resident part of city. All new constructed sidewalks should be of brick.

I find approximate as follows: Number of stone crossings in the city, 55. Number of wooden crossings in the city, 180. Number of wooden culverts in the city, 33. 1250 ft. Number of sewer pipe culverts in the city, 25. 888 ft.

Number of stone sidewalks in the city, 550 ft. Number of brick sidewalks in the city, 7585 ft. Number of wooden sidewalks in the city, 30 miles. All of which is respectfully submitted. Dated this 30th day of April, 1901.

On motion the public works committee was instructed to have all insurance on city property expiring May 1, 1901, renewed at once.

Ordinance No. 258, providing for the construction of sidewalks was read and passed its first reading without opposition.

Ordinance No. 257, regulating the sale of goods on the streets was read and passed its second reading, four councilmen voting aye, and two no.

On motion the council adjourned to meet Monday evening, May 6, at 8 o'clock and the newly elected council and officers were invited to be present.
