Within the past two weeks I have gone over the streets and sidewalks of the city on a tour of inspection for the purpose of ascertaining what improve should be made on the streets at the present time, and reporting the same. I find of the 180 wooden street cross ing about 50 in more or less bad condition, and of the 35 wood culverts about 10 of no service, and about the same number will soon have to be replaced. I would recommend that as soon a required wooden culverts be replaced with sewer pipe, and wooden cross walks replaced with stone. The average life of wooden culverts and wooden crossings is not more than five years, and the difference of cost of wooden and

cost of wooden culverts and sewer pipe is about the same. Sidewa'ks in many places are in need of being re-built, and I would recommend brick for walks. Cost about the same as wooden walks. There has been a great improvement in putting a large number of brick walk in the past year in resident part of city. All new con-structed sidewalks should be of brick.
