The idea of boycotting the Paris exposition next year because of the infamous verdict in the Dreyfus case is gaining alarming currency in all countries and it is possible that if the outrage is not corrected the patronage from outside countries will be very small indeed. This is but a deserving punishment, as a nation so corrupt as is evidenced by this verdict is not deserving of the patronage of justice-loving people, who do not desire by any act of theirs to give encouragement to such travesty of justce. The United States gover ment has now gone so far with its arrangements to be represented that it will be impossible for it to withdraw entirely but it is probable that the individual patronage will be very much affected unless that which everyone considers a great wrong, is righted.

Slavery Question in the Sulus.

By the signing of the treaty with the sultan of the Sulus the United States again holds sovereignty over slave territory. As long as congress does not assume control of the islands this is presumably not in violation of the thirteenth amendment to the constitution. It is, however, in violation of American ideas, and the nation would not be satisfied to regard slavery as a permanent fixture even in a Mohammedan dependency of this country. Action looking toward the abolition of slavery in the Sulus was happily begun simultaneously with the extension of American sovereignty over the islands. General Bates, who negotiated the treaty, encountered no trouble in getting the sultan to agree to an article giving all slaves the right to buy their own freedom, his only stipulation being that the price should be the market value. This is a fair beginning, but it should be followed with all reasonable promptness by measures which will wipe out the entire system.

At no distant date there should be enforced a stipulation that no new slaves shall be made through debt or otherwise and arrangements made by which the local government should purchase within a short term of years the freedom of such slaves as then remained in bondage, or some other plan should be devised by which those unable to purchase their liberty would be able to acquire it. The fugitive slave law that exists in all of those oriental countries should be speedily nullified, and cruelty to slaves should at once be prohibited.

This was the plan adopted by the British government in dealing with the same problem in the federated Malay states, and it worked very successfully, resulting in the complete abolition of the system in a comparatively short time. With the exercise of proper judgment and discretion the same end may doubtless be speedily achieved in the Sulu islands.


