

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HAWAIIANS ARE WORKED UP

Do Not Like the Lies of Transferring Power to the War Department.

PORT TOWNSEND, Wash., Nov. 1. According to advices brought from Honolula by the steamship Elihu Thompson, residents of the Hawaiian islands are in a great state of excitement over the receipt of a letter from Assistant Secretary of the Treasury Frank Vanderlip, stating that the customs department of the Hawaiian islands was under the control of the war department. The letter was in reply to an application for a position in the cus-

toms service by a resident of Honolulu. Many New Things Which Every Woman Wants to Know,



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
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
