

HAWAIIANS ARE WORKED UP.
Do Not Like the Idea of Transferring Power to the War Department.
PORT TOWNSEND, Wash., Nov. 1.—According to advices brought from Honolulu by the steamship Eihou Thompson, residents of the Hawaiian islands are in a great state of excitement over the receipt of a letter from Assistant Secretary of the Treasury Frank Vanderlip, stating that the customs department of the Hawaiian islands was under the control of the war department. The letter was in reply to an application for a position in the customs service by a resident of Honolulu. It is asserted that this is the first indication the authorities of the islands have received that the customs department has been transferred to the military, and when shown the letter Harold M. Sewall, special agent of the United States government, and the other government representatives, expressed a belief that the secretary had gotten the Hawaiian islands confused with Porto Rico, Cuba and other conquered territory. Major Mills, in command of two battalions of the Sixth artillery, stationed at Honolulu, disclaims any knowledge of the new regime. In relation to the above a rumor is in circulation in Honolulu that the present officers of the local government were to be removed by President McKinley and new appointments made immediately, but both President Dole and Special Agent Sewall deny having any knowledge of a contemplated change.

WINSLOW ON TRIAL.
Alleged Murderer of Edward Tilton Faces His Accusers.
DES MOINES, Nov. 1.—The trial of William Winslow, charged with the murder of Edward Tilton in Highland park on Sept. 6, was commenced this morning before Judge Bishop. Winslow was bound over to the grand jury by Justice Tris on a charge of murder in the first degree, an offense which is unobtainable and for which the penalty, if proved, is death or imprisonment for life. The indictment found by the grand jury was on the same charge and Winslow was placed on trial this morning for his life.

TRANSPORTATION HOME.
Iowa Soldiers' Fare Is Paid to the Point of Enlistment.
SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 1.—The Fifty-first Iowa volunteers have been notified by Adjutant General Byers that the state would furnish transportation from here to each man's actual home, no matter where he enlisted. The state has provided three special sleeping car trains and subsistence to leave here today with the regiment as fast as it is mustered out. The Iowans will be the guests of Council Bluffs and Des Moines as they pass through the state.

Minor Is Lost in Nebraska.
WALLACE, Ia., Nov. 1.—Mrs. Charles de Ford is here looking for her husband who left Joplin, Mo., on July 6, bound for the Coeur d'Alene mines. From men who started with him it is learned that he left the train at Alliance, Neb., since when nothing has been learned from him.

Revolt in a Chinese Province.
SHANGHAI, Nov. 1.—The North China Daily News has a dispatch from Chun King, dated yesterday, saying that a native revolt has broken out at Jen-Huieh-Sien, province of Kwei-Chow. A magistrate has been murdered and the situation is considered serious.

Wichita Pays the BTL.
WICHITA, Nov. 1.—In the absence of state authority to meet the cost the Wichita Commercial club has decided to send a battery and band to Topeka next Thursday to greet the Twentieth Kansas.

The New Orleans has arrived at Ponta Delgada, Azores, on her way to Manila.
Henry Adams Neely, bishop of the Protestant Episcopal diocese of Maine, died at Portland Tuesday night.
Captain Dyer has been relieved from his assignment as commandant of the Havana naval station, owing to ill-health.
Captain Nicoll Ludlow has been retired with the rank of rear admiral in the navy on his own application, after 30 years of service.
The legislative building at Durban, Natal, has been transformed into a hospital for the Boer and British wounded, who will be treated alike.
Governor Scofield of Wisconsin has written a letter on the Philippine question, in which he says it would be dangerous to the republic to keep the Philippines.

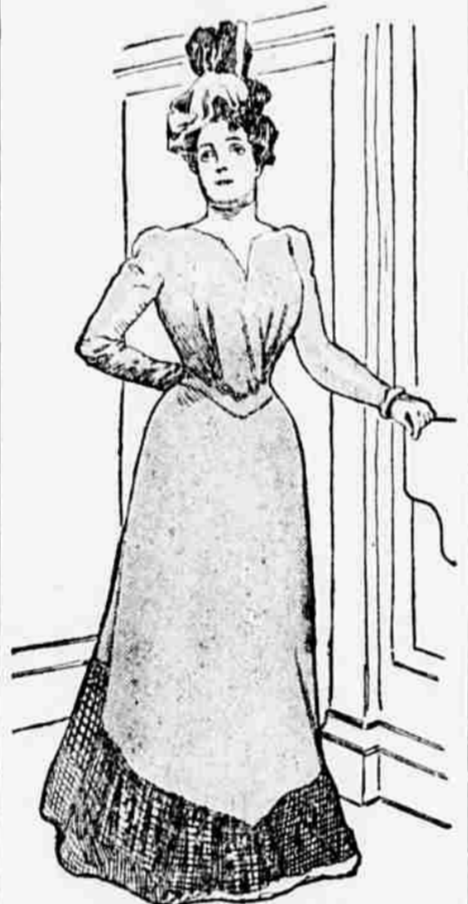

FRESH STYLES FOR FALL.
Many New Things Which Every Woman Wants to Know.
Hints on the fashions of the coming winter which will assist in the early preparation of "something fit to wear" are given as follows by a writer in the New York Herald, to whom an opportunity has been revealed some of the splendors and luxuries of coming modes as brought over by a returned foreign buyer for a swell shop.
This year's styles fulfill a twofold mission. They make the stout woman look thinner, and the slender woman becomes a dream of loveliness and shapeliness when she dons a princess effect gown, a Russian pelisse and a director's hat. Every skirt is tight fitting about the hips and very much flared around the bottom, sleeves are small, collars are high, some basques are shown, and fringe is the acme of novelty.
The favorite model in skirts will be a seamless circular shape, fitting like a glove over the hips and back and flaring at the bottom to the width of from 4 1/2 to 5 yards. This flare is very perceptible as the skirt is held up, with one hand holding the bottom and one the belt. The front breadth, which used to be cut perfectly straight in order to insure a "good hanging skirt," is now perceptibly flared in the skirts, which are made on the gored pattern, which will also be very much worn.
Of course the seamless skirt is suitable only for very slim figures, as it outlines the shape too plainly to be worn by a stout woman. The perfect fit and end of this skirt to make it hang properly will insure its exclusiveness. It could not be copied in cheap, ready-made skirts and have any kind of style to it.
The shaped Spanish flounce is also very much in evidence and will be more popular in cloths than the seamless cut, as it is suited to almost any figure. The upper part will still fit closely, but the flounce, allowing of so

One of the simplest yet smartest gowns shown to the writer was a costume of shepherd's plaid in a blue and white check. The lower skirt was devoid of any trimming, but flared considerably. The overskirt was a long, pointed affair, fitting like a glove over the hips and finished at the bottom by a 12 inch wavy fringe of the same colorings as the gown.
