A new drydock under construction at Newport News is large enough to hold two battleships at the same time. With our growing navy the necessity for ample drydocking facilities is apparent.

The lesson of small things is taught in the building of a million dollar Roman Catholic cathedral in Elizabeth, N. J., almost wholly as the result of dime contributions. The collection of these small donations was begun ten years ago, and the splendid cathedral, now completed, will be dedicated some time in November. It is intended that the chimes shall ring for the first time on New Year's eve to usher in the year 1900.

A neat and compact pamphlet has just been issued from the government printing office at Washington containing the statistics of the Indian tribes, agencies and schools in the United States. As it presents the latest information on this subject from official sources, its facts and figures are of interest. The total number of Indians at the agencies is 243,597. There are 64 agencies, 132 agency day schools, 10 independent day schools, 181 reservation boarding schools, 26 nonreservation schools and 32 contract schools and 340 Indian pupils have been placed, by way of experiment, in public schools. The largest agency is the Union agency, in the Indian Territory, with 77,018 population, divided as follows: Cherokees, 32,161; Chickasaws, 8,730; Choctaws, 18,456; Creeks, 14,771; and Seminoles, 2,900, while the smallest is the Sac and Fox agency, in Iowa, with 388 population. The three strongest tribes in the United States are the Cherokees, 32,161; Sioux, 21,668; and Navajoes, 20,500.
