FOUNDRY DEAL MADE.

E. A. Bullock Gets Half Interest in Sioux City Works.

HE WILL BE MANAGER OF BOTH.

The Business Here Will Not be Detrimentally Affected—Will Still Live in Norfolk. Has Disposed of His Interest in Pacific Hotel to H. H. Patterson.

E. A. Bullock has returned from Sioux City where he concluded a deal through which he becomes half owner in the foundry at that place, known as the Sioux Iron Works. His associate is Milton Perry Smith, who by the terms of the deal secures a half interest in the plant here. The company thus organized will conduct both works, of which Mr. Bullock will be manager. He will continue to reside in Norfolk, but his duties will require his presence in Sioux City occasionally. The new arrangement means no loss to Norfolk and will probably result in the betterment of the plant at this place.

John E. Cronk, who has been an efficient and competent assistant in the business here will be superintendent of the Norfolk plant while Mr. Smith will have charge of the works at Sioux City. It is planned to so conduct the two plants that a certain class of work will be given special attention at each institution. For instance in the manufacture of the popular warm air furnace a certain portion will be made here and another portion at Sioux City. This will result in opening up a field for that business which Mr. Bullock had not been able to enter under the former method of manufacture and those who know something of its success predict that its fame will soon spread throughout the country.

This plant will, between now and spring, be especially fitted for the manufacture of hot air registers, and other improvements both here and at Sioux City are under contemplation. An improvement at the Sioux City works will be the fitting up of machine and boiler shops and it is believed that the work which neither or both of the works cannot handle will be a very large and difficult contract indeed.

Both institutions are now very busy and the work is being rushed to their full capacity. As an instance of what the uniting of interests may mean to Norfolk it might be stated that on Mr. Bullock's return he brought a large order from Cherokee, Iowa, which will be filled here and others of a similar character are sure to follow.

The new corporation is capitalized at \$50,000 and its business starts out with every prospect of success.

The field for large works at Sioux City is large, as the Sioux works is the only foundry in the city and it is anticipated that the job work done there will be especially large.

Mr. Bullock's friends here will congratulate him on breaking his environment and reaching out into new fields and new territory worthy of his ability.

Sells Interest in Pacific Hotel.

Because of the new duties and responsibilities he has assumed E. A. Bullock this afternoon disposed of his interest in the Pacific hotel property to H. H. Patterson. This will give the latter gentleman a controlling interest in the stock of that institution and the ability with which he has conducted the affairs of the hotel since assuming the management speaks well for its future success. He makes an ideal landlord and his friends will be pleased to know that he has enlarged interests in the business.

A New Office.

The general office of the Plano Manufacturing company of Chicago was opened to the public yesterday afternoon in the Rome Miller building west of the express office. While the contemplated arrangements have not all been made,

enough was disclosed to show a perfect office for the business to be transacted.

The office will be occupied by Manager W. H. Blakeman and his assistants and from it will be directed the business of the company for the north half of Nebraska under the supervision of the Chicago headquarters. From here stock for the territory will be transferred and a full line of the implements manufactured will be kept on hand at all times.

The room is partitioned off with a woven steel netting, forming a lobby near the door for those having business and keeping the desk and office room free from intrusion. Behind this screen is an array of desks, chairs, cabinets for stationery and other fixtures for the handling of business. An eight-foot, standing desk, a large safe, some chairs and a settee in the lobby are yet to be added.

The large display window will be lettered with an appropriate advertisement of concave lettering and will be curtained. It will be used for a display of attractive advertisements of the company, it now containing a small working model of a mowing machine which attracts considerable attention. A large sign will also adorn the outside of the building.

In the rear of the main office is a room fitted up for private business transactions which contains a private telephone. A desk telephone will be used in the main office.

The company may well be proud of their achievements in this territory for which no small share of the credit may well be given to Mr. Blakeman. The office, besides being a great convenience, is an attractive addition to the business houses of Norfolk and the enterprise of the company should be highly esteemed not only by the people of the city but those of the entire territory represented.
