BIBLE STUDY IN THE UNIVERSITY.

The Bible Study dinner in the Y. M. C. A. rooms tonight promises to be an occasion long to be remembered because it marks the initiation of the annual Bible Study dinner into the life of the association.

The Bible classes are led either by the members taking turns, or by a leader appointed by the committee having the work in charge. No set program is used but each leader follows his own plan aided by suggestions from the Bible Study committee. This method gives the utmost freedom to informal discussions and produces a feeling of sympathy and equality of man to man.

The object of these classes is to induce a daily and systematic study of the Bible. Many colleges and universities have recognized the fact that no man's education is complete without a knowledge of its teachings and have accordingly placed it in the curriculum.

The importance of a close acquaintance with the Bible is too thoroughly recognized by all leading educators for any man to question the validity of its study, and the young man who goes through the university without having gained a knowledge of its fundamental teachings, will, sooner or later, wake up to the fact that he missed the most important part of his college course.

A NEW DEPARTURE IN LEGAL EDUCATION. "A LEGAL CLINIC."

A rather novel departure in the Law School of the University of Pennsylvania has been instituted this year by Assistant Professor Roberts. He calls it a Legal Clinic or Seminar, for want of some more

exact definition. The Seminar is open only to third year men, and is limited in number to twelve.

The work to be taken up this year will be discussion of the cases in the advance Reports of the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania. The method will be to have the history of the case read, then to engage in a general discussion of the procedural features of the case, the nature of the remedy, other remedies available, etc. The men will then be asked for opinions upon the points involved in the case and the method of their presentation to an appellate court. A decision on the case will be reached after this conference, and then the opinion of the Supreme Court will be read by some member of the class to see how nearly the judgment formed accords with the result reached by the court. The decision will then be tested in the light of the authorities cited by the court.

The benefits which it is believed will accrue from this work are of several sorts. In the first place, it will familiarize the men with the various forms of procedure and with the practical side of the presentation of points of law. It will also serve as a review of all the work that the men have done throughout their law school course, as the cases will be read indiscriminately in their order as reported. Further, the decision of the case by the class, before reading the opinion of the court, will serve to help the men on a sound legal judgment on complicated statements of fact. It is believed that the thorough drill in case analysis that will thus be gained cannot fail to be of service in actual work at the bar. Last but not least, it will familiarize the class with the current cases in Pennsylvania and render them ready in the citation of the late authorities on the points covered by the decisions read.
